OUR PORTLAND LETTER

Portland, Ore. Feb 28, (Special) —Officials of the Oregon Development League, who had worked for the passage of the bill providing for a state immigration commissioner, were non-plussed when Governor West announced last week he would veto the measure. They succeeded, however in inducing him to change his mind by waiving any claim to the \$25,000 appropriation the bill carried, so that the law will give the state the benefit of the United States Immigration Bureau work in placing desirable immigrants on the Oregon lands.

Lacking the necessary appropriation to carry on the work, public spirited citizens of Portland will shoulder the expense. The passage of the law will at least provide for state indorsement of promotion literature that shall be issued to attract immigration and this will make this matter authoritative so it will carry more weight and at the same time guard against boomer matter. This will be for the benefit of the whole state and not for any section alone. A state book, showing Oregon's advantages, will be issued under the seal of the new commissioner.

The first organized party of settlers to come to Central Oregon by the new railroad now in operation into the interior arrived during the past week and took possession of the Baldwin ranch of 30,000 acres at Hay Creek, which they have bought. There were 25 in the party, which traveled in a special car from the East. The newcomers will begin the development of their property at once and the big ranch will be cut up into small farms in order to bring it up to the maximum of production.

The people of Florence will hold the annual rhododendron festival this spring, and a committee has been named to make the arrangements. This festival is one of the most attractive of its kind held anywhere and many people of the Willamette Valley visit it each year.

Tom Richardson, father of the Oregon Development League, who was active for years in publicity work in this state, has accepted an invitation to visit Baltimore from March 6 to 20th at a large salary to advise the Greater Baltimore Committee and assist in raising a promotion fund of \$500,000. This money will be used in bidding for trade in the South. Mr. Richardson will return shortly to Oregon, but will make addresses in a number of Eastern cities this Spring.

A suggestion comes from Polk County that people of the whole state might adopt with profit. A family recently came there from the East, bought a farm and intended to live there permanently. After a time they sold their land and returned to the East. The reason was that nobody visited them, their neighbors did not seem to know of their existence and the newcomers quit the state in disgust. The Dallas Itemizer has the right idea when it says: "If you want newcomers make them feel at home."

The events of the past week illustrate in a striking way the advantages of the Oregon climate. The first was the planting of roses in Portland parks on Washington's Birthday, and the second was the Multnomah Club swim in the ocean at Gearhart last Sunday. Such stunts as these call attention to the mild winters of the Northwest and attract people here from the frigid East.

Mr. and Mrs. A. P. Kerron, who, with Lambert Dunbar, owned some property on the Ireland ridge, moved back to Portland last Monday, having sold their interests to a Mr. Cooper, of Portland.

Hood River's New Enterprise

Following the discovery of springs containing valuable medicinal properties, a stock company has purchased the E. R. Manning property, on the east side of Hood River and near the town, and will build a large sanitarium. The Hood River News, quoting one of the promoters, says:

"The discovery of the valuable mineral worth of the springs was made last summer, when an analysis of the water was made by an expert Portland chemist and pronounced to contain very high curative qualities. The property has been purchased by a stock company which has been organized to take over the grounds and build thereon an immense and beautiful health and summer resort, including a hotel with 200 rooms, a large sanitarium and natatorium. The natatorium will have two large swimming pools, one will be open for the use of all, the other will be for the use of ladies and children. Beautiful parks and boulevards will surround the hotel and natatorium. In fact, it is the intention of the company to make this the most modern and up-to-date resort of its kind in the Pacific Northwest. Vegetables, fruits, poultry and eggs for table use will be produced on the property.

"We believe this new Hood River enterprise will prove a profitable investment; that it will be the means of attracting hundreds of people to the valley and give added value to the property, as well as be a boon to the public.

"Located permanently in our city and in close proximity there are 10,000 people who have no place to go for recreation. With a beautiful health resort located within a few miles of their homes, they will have an added attraction for the Hood River country, where dollars grow on trees. We believe every resident of the Hood River valley should give this project their earnest support. It is a home project and one destined to help the country. In no other section of this United States can be found such an ideal spot for a resort of this kind as the one that has just been discovered.

"In addition to the Manning property, another tract has just been secured a few miles from the springs, to which water has been piped, and that will be converted into a park and camping ground."

The incorporators of the company are C. D. Nickelsen, M. R. Woodburn and E. J. Woodburn. Wm. Davidson, a well known Portland business man is fiscal agent.

Apple Grades Adopted
[Oregonian]
WALLA WALLA, Wash., Feb. 28—(Special)—Fruitgrowers representing the various districts of the Northwest met here today and with little preliminary talking at once got down to business. As a result the first day's work shows agreement on a uniform system of grading apples for packing, which is to be followed by the entire Northwest.

It includes "extra fancy," "standard" and "C" grades. The first is to be of perfect apples, in which red varieties are to show 75 per cent color and part-red varieties 50 per cent. The standard is the same, save that a single sting, scab the size of a nickel and lack of color is permissible. "C" grade includes all other merchantable apples.

The scab clause in the standard grade was secured by C. H. Sproat, of Hood River, who said the apple industry of Oregon would be seriously affected if scab were not allowed to exist in standard apples. It is against the Washington law, but will be permitted in Oregon shipments.

The establishment of the central selling agency, seems certain, there being no opposition so far as can be ascertained. A committee of seven is working on the details of a plan similar to that of the fruit exchange of California and it is probable that it will be adopted tomorrow or Thursday.
