**Hood River Man All Right**

Friends of A. A. Jayne, a prominent attorney of Hood River, will be relieved of their anxiety as to his welfare. Some time ago Mr. Jayne went to Mexico and for some time neither his wife nor his friends could get a line on him and it was feared he had come to grief. The following special to the Oregonian has set their minds at rest:

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Feb. 26—(Special)—A. A. Jayne, an attorney of Hood River, Or., who has been reported as missing in Mexico, has been found. For weeks his wife, who is now in this city, has been urging the State Department at Washington to do all in its power to find her husband, but in vain. Today she received a telegram from the missing man himself, saying that in company with G. D. Dods-worth, a Los Angeles capitalist, he had gone into the interior of Sonora, so far beyond the bounds of civilization that he had been unable to communicate with the outside world. The telegram was dated Hermosillo, to which point Mr. Jayne had been able to make his way. Although brief, the message announces that both men have suffered much hardship and privation, but sets at rest the rumor that they were captured by roving bandits or revolutionists. Mrs. Jayne, who has been completely prostrated with anxiety over the fate of her husband, was almost as completely overcome by the receipt of the telegram. She has notified her friends in Oregon who have shared her anxiety, and the State Department at Washington, which had promised to aid in the search for the missing man, of the return of her husband to civilization.

Everyone is familiar with the conditions existing in China, where thousands upon thousands are dying by starvation.
