OUR PORTLAND LETTER

Portland, Ore., Mar. 14, (Special) — After a careful and exhaustive study of market conditions in the Pacific Northwest during the past eight years, President Harvey Beckwith, of the Portland Commercial Club, makes the startling statement that prices paid to farmers for eleven different articles of food, all necessities, advanced 31.4 per cent between April, 1902 and October 1910, and he backs up his statement by quotations from market reports published in Portland during that period.

"These figures," said President Beckwith, "indicate that Portland is a high-priced market for farm produce, and the high prices are directly chargeable to the great increase in consumption over production. The demands of a rapidly growing population have more than kept pace with the increase in the quantity of essential foodstuffs sent to market by the farmers of the state, and this condition is one that is not likely to be changed for a long time, if ever, and the situation is a very inviting one to the producer."

"In the table of prices submitted herewith are two items to which I desire to call particular attention,—eggs and poultry. There is no good reason why the Pacific Northwest should not produce eggs and chickens enough to fully supply the local demand and thus relieve the wholesalers from the necessity of ordering carload after carload from the Middle West. There is absolutely no danger of overproduction in these lines, in fact, there is little prospect that the supply will ever exceed, or even equal, the demand."

"Let us assume that there are 5,000 farmers in Oregon and that at the present time each farmer is keeping an average of 20 hens. It is probably fair to estimate that each hen will raise, during the coming Summer, a brood of ten chickens and during the balance of the year will lay 12 dozen eggs. The chickens should certainly be worth 50 cents each when ready for market, and the eggs will sell at a minimum price of 25 cents per dozen, a total of \$8.00, and the farmer still has the original hen. An addition of only one hen by each farmer, on this basis, will amount to \$40,000 annually and, if given the time and attention this important industry deserves, the net returns from the poultry yards of the state may easily exceed those from the wheat fields."

A banquet in the Portland Commercial Club during the past week was attended by over 200 men and women more or less directly interested in the dairy interests of the state. Speeches were made by C. C. Chapman, representing the Commercial Club, T. S. Townsend, representing the creamery interests, Dr. Andrew C. Smith, of the State Board of Health, Prof. F. L. Kent, dean of the dairy department of the Oregon Agricultural College, W. W. Cotton, representing the Harriman system, and others, and the subject was discussed in all its bearings. At the close of the meeting a committee was appointed to formulate plans under which the various interests could be brought together for future practical and effective co-operation.

—A prominent feature of the report of the Promotion Committee of the Portland Commercial Club that has just been made to the business men who maintain the work deals with the splendid spirit shown by the whole state in co-operating with this city. Tributes to the state press were paid, for it was realized that without its help, little could be accomplished in the big development movement under way throughout the Pacific Northwest.

It was conceded that the edi-

tors were the best boosters there are. Heads of the Portland papers attended the biennial dinner of the Club and helped with suggestions for furthering the work. They are among the most active ones in this city in the cause and the same is true of the editors throughout Oregon; their work is incessant and is very effective.

The report of Manager C. C. Chapman of the Promotion Committee of the Club gives due credit for this valuable work. The co-operation of the various commercial bodies of the state through the Oregon Development League was mentioned with appreciation, as was the assistance of other Coast cities in helping along movements of mutual welfare.

Portland business men who have contributed to the funds of the Promotion Committee were shown that their support has been a great benefit in building up the state at large as well as their own city and the detailed work shows the funds have been well spent.

Chairman Johnson of the Promotion Committee emphasized the great future of Portland and the Northwest and showed the need for continued effort along lines so far followed. The work of the Inquiry Bureau of the Commercial Club, the convention and industrial bureaus and the press bureau was reviewed and progress noted in all the varied activities. Greatest progress for the future is the purpose of the Promotion Committee and this ambition extends throughout the state.

Northwest's Apple Crop

It has been argued by some timid horticulturists and by others who are apparently ignorant of the real condition of the apple market, that the acreage of orchards was increasing so rapidly that the apple market would be glutted, resulting in heavy loss to the orchardist. According to the reports of prominent apple growers and apple buyers it is impossible to overstock the market with good apples,—the kind raised in this section. According to an exchange, the immense apple crop of the Northwest becomes only a drop in the bucket, viewed in the proper light. If the crop is marketed in a business-like way and properly distributed, it will be a long time before the Northwest will glut the markets. The apple crop of California, Colorado, Utah, Montana, Idaho, Oregon and Washington probably did not exceed 15,000 cars in 1910. Six hundred boxes to the car, 100 apples, average, to the box, would make 900,000,000 apples. If properly distributed, so that every inhabitant of the United States could eat one apple a day, they would eat up every apple of this wonderful crop grown in these states in ten days. This is a plea for greater distribution, and also a strong argument for increased acreage of commercial apples.

Big Electric Power along Columbia

Manager B. P. Bailey of the Pacific Power & Light company, which is the holding company owning the Hood River Light & Power Co., in a statement at The Dalles last week said in regard to the big plant the company is completing at White River:

"When our machines are installed our work at White river will not be completed, as a big 1800 horsepower machine has been ordered for delivery for June 1 and will be installed as soon after as possible."

When asked if the White river could furnish enough water to drive these three machines Mr. Bailey said:

"We do not expect to use all of the machines all the year around at present. However the river will give us enough water to drive all of them in the season when the load is the heaviest, from November to March, and by the first of next year we expect to have a power line in here from Pasco so that we can help out the White river plant with 'juice' from the upper Columbia."

"Plans are now complete and construction will soon be started on this line which will come down the south bank of the Columbia through The Dalles and connect with our plant at Hood River. This will give this city an absolutely reliable electric service at all times and should the White river plant fail entirely we could still supply all of our customers from the Pasco line."

The plans of the Pacific Power & Light company include the furnishing of power to many of the big irrigation projects along the Columbia river between this city and Pasco. Arrangements have also been made for the erection of a special power line to Chenoweth creek to give power and light service to the ranch owners of that district. This line will also supply the light and power for people who buy tractors and build homes in Fruitland park, which the Washington-Oregon Investment Co. recently purchased from J. A. Fleck.—Hood River News.
