## OUR PORTLAND LETTER

Portland, Ore., Mar. 21, (Special) —Although the whole state has its full quota of new settlers who are taking advantage of the low colonist fares, Central Oregon towns are especially busy welcoming the newcomers. Large additions to the usual accommodations are being made to house the homeseekers and extra efforts are being made to care for their wants until they shall become permanently settled.

Homesteads are being taken in large numbers, irrigation lands are being bought and new towns are building because of the rush of immigrants who are following the railroads into the interior. Trainloads of supplies, building materials and agricultural implements are going in and the long-delayed awakening of Central Oregon has arrived, after that section has lain dormant for ages awaiting the whistle of the locomotive.

Dates for the Oregon Development League convention at Astoria have been fixed for Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, August 14, 15, and 16. This will be while the Astor Centennial is in progress and convention visitors will give a part of their time to this historic celebration. The convention dates were decided after a conference between the Astoria Commercial Club and the Centennial management.

Salem will have a horse show on April 7 and 8. It is expected the event will bring out a fine display of draft, carriage and riding horses and a campaign will be started right away to raise funds for awards that will insure a large list of entries.

Redmond will have a double-barreled celebration on July 4th and Independence Day will not be its only significance. The unloading of Central Oregon by the railroads and freedom from its long isolation will be the chief reasons for the jollification. Redmond is on both the Oregon Trunk and the Deschutes railroads and it sees a great future now that outlets have been made to the outside world.

Mining men of the state met in Portland during the past week to make plans for the entertainment here of the Northwest Mining Congress on May 16, 17 and 18. At that time it is expected to have each district of the state represented and large numbers of outside mining men will be entertained.

Special fares have been made by the railroads for travel to the Portland Rose Festival, June 5-10, a rate of one and one-third the usual tariffs for the round trip having been agreed upon by the various lines. Oregon, Washington, Idaho and British Columbia will get the benefit of these reduced fares.

Salem lays claim to a unique distinction among all the capital cities of the United States. It has made a greater net gain in population than any other state capital. Salem shows additions to her population amounting to 231.9 per cent during the ten-year period, as given in the figures of the census. No other state capital comes anywhere near this record.

## Davenport Heirs Meet

The Davenport family, consisting of J. T. Davenport, of Mosier, Charles and George Davenport and Mrs. Robinson, of Portland, Mrs. Kate Kemp, of Hood River, Mrs. Gunning and Miss Alice Davenport, of The Dalles, and Mrs. Ray Sturgess, of Mosier, met here last Saturday to arrange plans for the division of the Davenport estate. We understand that satisfactory arrangements were made, with the exception of the children of a deceased sister, Mrs. Edw. Wood, for whom a guardian will be appointed to represent their interests.

## A Suggestion

The following suggestion, taken from the Glacier, of Hood River, is sensible and timely, and very applicable to Hood River, Mosier, and all localities where the display of the principal product serves as an advertisement for those localities. It is a peculiar fact that visitors, or the traveling public, are never served at the hostesseries with "the best the market affords" of the very things that the different sections excel in raising, whether it be apples, beef, mutton, or what not. People traveling thru a fruit country expect to be served with the finest the country can raise. The same in a stock country. On the contrary, the best is sent to outside markets and the poorest is left for home consumption. It is a very shortsighted policy and mitigates against the section, no matter how widely advertised. The suggestion follows:

Many of the visitors to our city are often heard to remark that they would like to see some of the famous Hood River apples on the table at meal time. And in fact it is true that the cafes, hotel dining rooms and restaurants of the city are failing to take advantage of making use of one of the best advertisements not only for themselves but also of the Valley. It is true the stranger, when he alights from the train may be able to tell about the beauty of the apples from the displays in the windows of the real estate dealers. However, add to this the possibilities of getting in closer relations with the sightseer by making an appeal to his stomach and you can see the value of the suggestion. Since the Valley is so justly famous for its horticultural products it should become a distinctive feature of the entertainment of guests here to serve him with the best apples: for a man often remembers what he has eaten longer than he does that which he has seen.

**Favors Central Selling Agency**  
One of the largest English buyers of northwest apples has strongly endorsed the proposed central selling agency. He says that such an organization would simplify matters considerably for exporters. This class of trade is important, because it is using more and more of the northwest's high-grade fruit each year. He said that now the foreign buyer is put to a large expense by having to send agents to this country each spring to get a line on the crop and again in the fall to buy. This exporter points out that the exchange would be the means of cutting down the foreign buyers' expenses and regulate other conditions now unsatisfactory.

In all of the northwest fruit districts, the central selling agency scheme is being discussed at length and reports are being received that it will gain many converts.

Just what action the big buyers on the Atlantic coast would take in regard to the foreign buyers under these circumstances is not known, but there is no doubt that they would put up a fight against taking the handling of the fruit away from them. —Hood River Glacier.

People who have been wondering why the exhibit building at the depot has not yet been built, will be glad to know that the material is here and work will begin as soon as the lease papers have been returned from railroad headquarters at Portland. It appears that some technicality in the papers required "fixing". This should have been attended to some time ago, but thru an oversight was neglected. We are informed, however, that work will commence immediately. Guy Wilson has the contract for the erection of the building, and he states that everything is ready to begin work as soon as he receives the authority.
