Plan New Highway from Here to Mosier

A subscription petition is being circulated for a better road between Hood River and Mosier, and is meeting with favor. Seven hundred dollars has been subscribed toward the project by private subscription, and later the county court will be asked to aid in its construction.

As outlined, the plan is to start the road in by the gravel pit on the east side road, near the place of H. S. Reed, and extend it to connect with the present highway on top of the hill. It is stated that this will give a grade of seven to eight per cent, instead of 16 to 18 as at present, and the proposed new road will also be a trifle shorter. Peter Saltzman and other property owners along the road are taking an active interest in the matter and believe that the valley and city will both benefit by having a better road from Hood River to Mosier.—Hood River News.

Good News For Postmasters

Individual postmasters throughout the country have recently been endeavoring to secure the consent of the postal department, and their local patrons, to close the office on Sunday. Efforts to that end were made at The Dalles, which were successful, and Mosier residents have been agitating the question, with good prospects of the plan working here. However, it will be unnecessary to take any further steps in the matter, according to the Oregonian of Wednesday, which says:
Sunday work in post offices throughout the country is to be discontinued so far as consistent with rapid transmission of the mails.

It is not proposed to close important postoffices entirely. Certain work to prevent congestion and delay must be done. Mails will be received and dispatched as heretofore, and arrangements will be made for a limited delivery through the general delivery window.

Special delivery letters will be delivered and patrons of any office will be afforded the privilege of having their mail delivered on Sunday by depositing the required fee for special delivery service.

Postmaster General Hitchcock today issued instructions designed to carry into effect these ideas and to afford employees of the Postal Service one day's rest in seven.

The Color of Flowers

The colors of flowers have been frequently studied from the chemical point of view as well as from the biological—that is, in relation to the adjustment of plants to their surroundings. But very little has heretofore been done with the physical problems involved. A recent study of the physical basis of the colors in the petals of flowers brings out the fact that the brilliant appearance of many flowers is due not to the character of the pigment in the cells of the petals but to the presence of air spaces between the cells in the deeper layers; these enclosed air bubbles reflect from their surfaces in such manner as to give the brilliant appearance. The great variety of colors among flowers is produced by a comparatively small number of pigments. The explanation for this lies in the fact that a few pigments combined in different ways or in different proportions produce a variety of effects. Thus, a combination of two complementary pigments, one of which absorbs the light rays not absorbed by the other, will produce the effect of "black". In a similar manner gray tones and browns are produced. The shape of the epidermal or skin cells is also found to modify the effect by modifying the refraction and the reflection of light.—Ex.
