OUR PORTLAND LETTER

Portland, Or., April 11 (Special) -Wheat growers of 28 counties of the Pacific Northwest, 13 in Oregon, 6 in Idaho and 9 in Washington, members of the Farmers' Union, have secured a lease on Columbia Dock No. 1, for the season and propose to handle their crop from the field to the ships taking it to foreign markets.

The purpose of the move is not solely to handle the grain of the members but to make a profit out of the traffic. Purchases of grain will be made in the wheat belt just as individual firms buy it and plans are being made for the incorporation of a transportation company. Sales of wheat will be made on the dock terms being f o b Portland.

Rice in Oregon may soon become an accomplished fact for experiments have been undertaken on a tract of irrigated land at Stayton, where a dozen varieties of rice will be planted as soon as the land can be gotten into condition. The work is in charge of Charles Chambliss, a government expert in rice culture.

Receipts of livestock at the Portland yards for the first three months of the year show great gains over the corresponding period of last year. Totals were: cattle, 7996; sheep, 25,018; hogs, 6982. The increase over the first quarter of 1910 is: cattle, 247; sheep, 20,029; hogs, 2053.

The Breeders' Spring sale of blooded horses will be held in Portland April 18-22. There promises to be a large showing of fine horses and some pure bred cattle will also be offered.

Letters of thanks have been received from China by Ben Selling, who collected the famine relief fund, and gratitude is expressed for the recent contribution of \$5,000 made by Portland people and received in Hong Kong for distribution.

Klamath County has set what appears to be an egg record. Harry Caden had 15 ordinary hens that laid 256 eggs last month. Six of the hens are pullets and did not begin to lay until after the first week of the month.

Visits to all the irrigation projects in the state will be made during the year by the State Board. State Engineer Lewis is now planning the inspection. Several new projects have been taken up that have never been visited by the state officials as yet.

Portland had a birthday this week, being 60 years old. Its municipal government was organized April 7, 1851, for on that date the first election was held. Then there was one precinct; now there are 155.

Eastern eggs are coming into Portland at the rate of about one carload per day, although the receipts of Oregon eggs are much heavier than former seasons. The eggs now being received from the East are not offered for sale, but are going into storage to remain until the usual scarcity and high prices next winter will make their sale profitable. It makes but little difference to the Oregon consumer who pays the bill whether the eggs are used now or next winter. The fact that it is necessary to bring eggs into the country for use at any time is conclusive evidence that we are not making the most of our opportunities. Poultry raising has proved an unqualified success in a dozen localities throughout the state and with eggs and chickens always commanding high prices there is no good reason why we should not produce at least enough to supply the home demand.

Some Oregon Activities

Independence will enlarge its creamery at a cost of \$5,000. At Ontario a pumping plant will be installed to water 10,000 acres. Freewater has struck artesian water and irrigation from this source will reclaim a large acreage.

During March, Portland exported 729,115 bushels of wheat; 98,955 barrels of flour, and 4,539-450 feet of lumber. E. W. McComas, of Pendleton, estimates the wheat crop of Umatilla County this year will amount to 5,000,000 bushels.

The Deschutes Valley is rich in land plaster and a mill with a capacity of 30 tons daily will be in operation at Bend by April 15. Pendleton's foremost and oldest industry is its flour milling. Its annual shipment of flour to the Orient alone came to 400,000 sacks.

The Dalles had considerable building activity during the past month. March statistics showed over 100 new houses, valued at \$103,375. An immense wool warehouse is to be erected at Metolius. The town will handle a large part of the wool clip of Central Oregon, which amounts to over 1,000,000 pounds annually.

Salem has become a manufacturing center. It has 45 factories employing 1510 workmen. The monthly payroll is \$90,390 and the value of the annual product is more than \$4,000,000. Experiments will be made at Stayton on irrigated land to determine if rice can be grown successfully in Oregon. The investigation is in charge of a Government expert on rice culture.

The Portland Union Stockyards show a great gain in stock shipments for the first three months of 1911 as against the similar period of 1910. Sheep gain 20,029 head, hogs 2053 and cattle 247.

Grants Pass has adopted a population of 40,000 by the next census. People of the Southern Oregon district are not going to sit down and wait idly for it to be realized but will work definitely toward that end.

An immense power plant on the Rogue River near Prospect is now under construction and will cost several million dollars. The plant, when complete, will have three units of 8,000 horsepower each.

The Columbia River Road Efforts are still being made by Portland capitalists to have the Portland-Hood River road built. It is estimated that the building of the road from Portland to Multnomah Falls, a distance of three miles, would cost \$10,000.
