Death of Mrs. Huskey
Died, at her home in Mosier on Sunday, May 7th, of pneumonia, Mrs. Matilda Jane Huskey, at the age of 70 years.
Mrs. Huskey was born in Sevier county, Tenn., in 1841. In 1832 she came to Oregon, settling near The Dalles. About two years later she came to Mosier, where she had since lived.
About two weeks ago Mrs. Huskey took a severe cold which quickly developed into pneumonia. Her advanced age and physical condition rendered her an easy victim and she died within a week of being taken sick.
Mrs. Huskey was perhaps as well known as any pioneer in this section, tho she lived a quiet, uneventful life. She was regarded as a devoted mother and a kind friend and neighbor, always ready to help her neighbor in distress. She will be missed by many.
Three sons survive her: W. E. and George Huskey of Mosier, and J. W. Huskey of Alberta, Canada.
The funeral services were conducted by Rev. K. H. Sickafoose in the Christian Church and interment was made in Odd Fellows cemetery. A large number of friends and neighbors attended the services. The Odd Fellows, of which order her sons are members, and the Rebekahs, clnd in their regalia, attended in a body. The floral offerings were beautiful and appropriate.
