CHINA'S GREAT WALL

Wonder of World Is Literally Wall of Blood.

For Twenty-One Centuries It Has Remained the Most Amazing Construction of Human Hands—Builder's Name Cursed.

Pekin.—Best known by repute of all the wonders of the world, the great wall of China has remained for 21 centuries the most amazing construction of human hands. Ruined and broken as it is, it is clear at first sight that the amount of human labor required to build this majestic barrier is without parallel on earth. Fifteen hundred miles long with additional towers that add another 1,000 miles, there were originally 25,000 watch towers upon it.

The wall was built at the end of the third century before Christ by the first emperor, and perhaps the greatest, of all Chinese emperors. Che-Hwang-te, prince of Tsin, succeeded as a boy to the throne of a comparatively small kingdom and at once began to put into a state of order and defence a territory that long had been allowed to degenerate into a mere prey to annual northern invaders. After a few years the young king assumed the style of emperor and organized the forces of what for the first time in history was China. For he at once gave to the whole of this new empire the name of his own small state. He then marched out against the Tartars, his hereditary and perennial enemies in the north. After routing these marauding pests he was recalled for the usual oriental need of

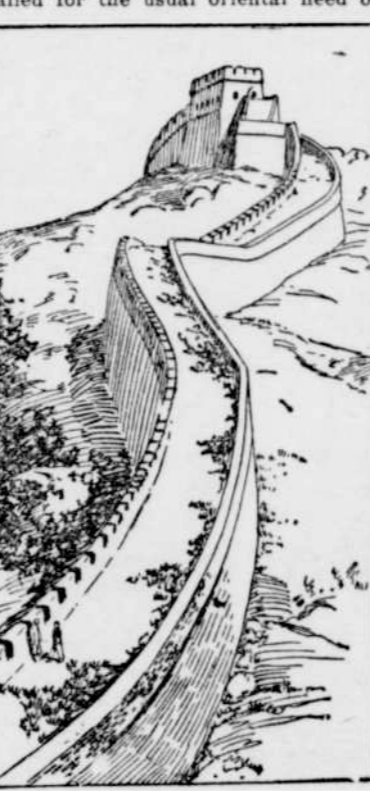
crushing out the seeds of rebellion at home. It was probably in order that he should not again find himself thus between two enemies that he conceived the gigantic defense of which the larger part remains to this day.

Undeterred by the magnitude of the task and the terrible loss of life that its construction must involve, Che-Hwang-te slowly forged his way from many centers, once along the entire northern boundary of what was then the Chinese empire. Che-Hwang-te enlisted the workers in many ways and from many quarters. Some of his press gang work was hardly creditable, for it is on record that the mere possession of a book condemned the wretched owner to four years' hard labor on the wall.

But as the Chinese proverb has it: "The annihilation of one generation has proved the salvation of others," and for many centuries the great wall served its purpose well.

Disappointment generally awaits the mortal who has heard much about some celebrated object and does visit it; so seldom does the reality come up to expectation. But the great wall is not overrated. Behold it by starlight or moonlight, gaze on it in twilight or in sunlight; view it through the haze of a dust fog, or between the flakes of a snowstorm, ever is the wall one great, gray, silent, still specter of the past, cresting the mountain peak or reposing in the shady valley. So vast is it that perhaps alone of all man's handiwork it could be discerned from the moon. So vast is it that were its materials disposed around the earth at the equator they would provide a wall eight feet high and three feet thick.

When we reflect on the labor needed to erect it we slowly divine the toll exacted from countless thousands, the sweat and tears and blood that must have been shed and we are prepared to hear that after two millennia the name of Che is cursed all along the wall by the descendants of those who were driven to the hateful task, who labored in deathly fear lest when flesh and blood failed to respond to the taskmaster's scourge, flesh and blood should be hurled into the mass of concrete to provide more material for the all-devouring monster. It is a wall of blood!

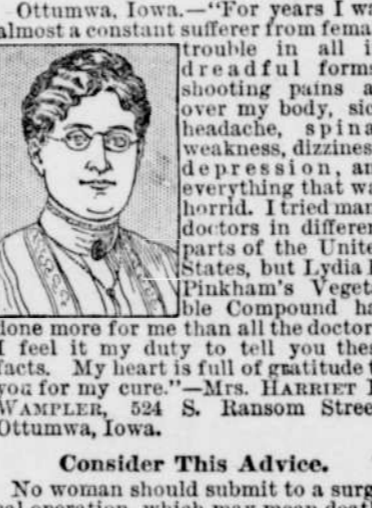
Practical economy.

CURRENT EVENTS OF THE WEEK

Doings of the World at Large Told in Brief.

General Resume of Important Events Presented in Condensed Form for Our Busy Readers.

Chihuahua, Mexico, is making every preparation for a siege by rebels.

An American aviator made a record of 100 miles an hour at Rheims, France.

Madero discusses prospects for peace, but continues his preparations to carry the war to the Mexican capital.

The Milwaukee road will start two new trains, the Olympian and Columbian, between Chicago and the Coast May 28.

A banker's son, supposed to have committed suicide at Seattle, has been found working on an Alaska steamer.

The Supreme court has set aside the jail sentences of Gompers, Mitchell and Morrison, labor leaders convicted of contempt of court.

A captive balloon at Stockton, Cal., broke loose and ran amuck with four people in the basket, but all escaped with considerable bumping.

Julius Kruttschnitt, vice president of the Harriman lines, says he wants to spend his declining years on an apple orchard of his own in the Rogue River valley of Oregon.

Striking furniture makers at Grand Rapids, Mich., beat the police in a fight with stones, clubs and revolvers, but were subdued by a fire company turning streams of water on them.

Pacific Coast investors were bilked of \$1,782,514 by the United Wireless swindle.

A "progressive" movement has been started by 28 Republican senators of Illinois.

Madero has organized a provisional government and is preparing to march on the capital of Mexico.

United States allow food supplies and merchandise to cross the Mexican border freely, but no munitions of war.

A committee of the Ohio senate is "investigating" reporters.

Railway trainmen of the United States and Canada will gain \$37,000,000 yearly by the increase of wages during the past year.

General Mena, minister of war, has made Diaz president of Nicaragua and has given the United States control of the nation's finances.

Indictments have been issued charging nine men with defrauding the government out of more than \$10,000,000 worth of Alaska claims.

War on Flies.

It is estimated that \$10,000,000 is spent annually for fly screens, while the wholesome out-of-door life left to the enemy. In addition, there are expensive and disagreeable poisons, sticky paper and other devices for killing off the pest. Dr. Clifton F. Hodge, professor of biology at Clark University, will endeavor to make Worcester, Mass., "a flyless city." He has a practical plan to get rid of house flies, which spread typhoid fever and other diseases. He proposes to educate the people to cooperate with him and will start on his campaign of prevention as soon as flies begin to appear in the spring. Students will be assigned to a dairy, another to a barn and every breeding place of the insect pest will be under surveillance.
