Astoria Regatta Program

ASTORIA, Oregon.—(Special.)—This is the complete program as announced by the Regatta Committee of the Astoria Centennial with the prizes in each event. The Free-for-All Pacific Coast championship has a purse of \$3000, while the displacement boat championship has a purse of \$2500, a total of \$5500 in prize money for two events alone.
