OUR PORTLAND LETTER

Portland, Or., May 2 (Special)—Portland will be pretty much given up to its Rose Festival for the next ten days. Business affairs will be relegated to the background quite generally and the queen flower will rule with undisputed sway.

This year's spectacle promises to set a new mark, with better displays, more gorgeous pageants and better decorations of city streets and buildings than ever before. Other Oregon cities will participate to larger extent than formerly and out-of-town people have announced their intention of coming in large numbers.

The city election will distract attention to some extent from the Festival on June 5, opening day, but with that out of the way, the remainder of the week will be given up to enjoyment. Portland rose gardens promise to produce a wealth of perfect blooms next week.

Members of the Esperanto Association of the Pacific Northwest will gather at the Portland Commercial Club for a grand rally July 19-21. A big attendance is expected from Oregon and Washington particularly, while other states will be represented. The association is now one year old. At least 25 of the leading cities of this state have regular Esperanto classes. On June 4, local Esperantists will hold a picnic at Tualatin.

A systematic campaign for German immigrants has been outlined by the Commercial Club, acting with the German-speaking societies of Oregon. A conference on the subject was held recently and in future more attention will be paid to securing this immigration.

Dayton has been presented with historic Fort Sheridan by the Government and the old structure will be removed to the Dayton city park. The old blockhouse is an interesting relic of the days when the pioneers were subduing the wilderness.

Baker and Oregon City are two places that will have postal savings banks, such institutions already started in this state having proved highly successful. The Postmaster General has designated these cities as depositories and they will begin operations at once.

Oregon's importance as a fruit growing state can be better understood from the figures in the biennial report of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture, lately issued. President W. K. Newell places the total valuation of last year's fruit crop at \$6,662,500. Apples lead the list with a value of \$2,500,000 and dried prunes stand second in importance with a value of \$1,680,000.

An interurban railway from Baker through the Powder River Valley to Haines and North Powder is a project dear to the heart of the Baker Commercial Club and efforts will be directed on work to bring this about during the coming few months. The projected line would open up a remarkably fertile country, as well as give access to much timber wealth.

Mosier Team Again Victorious

Quite a large crowd of fans assembled at the new ball grounds last Sunday to witness the game between Mosier and The Dalles. Perhaps most of the audience expected a repetition of the former game between these two teams, when Mosier got it put all over them. Of course there were those who were willing to back their judgment, thereby proving themselves both wise and foolish, according to the way they "sized up" the situation. The Mosier boys proved themselves the "dark horse" this time, however, and romped over the plate eight times while the visiting team got home but once in the entire nine innings. The Dalles boys said they had a "sick boss" behind the bat, but they all needed the whip and spur. They scored

once in the first inning and up to the fourth it was a pretty good game, with both teams playing steady and holding each other level. From the first of the fifth to the end there was nothing but joy for the Mosier boys, who played a whirlwind game and threw gravel in the faces of the visitors all the way round the track, winning by "eight lengths."

There is some complaint among the ball boys, and justly, too, that the people of Mosier do not "come thru" with the price of admission. Every time a visiting team comes here it costs the boys from \$12 to \$20. They are not playing altogether for their own amusement but for the public as well, and they think it only right that the public should help to defray the expenses. They are not so situated that they can prevent anyone seeing the game who does not pay for the privilege, as it is the case in most places, and they have to depend on individuals collecting the price from the onlookers. It is difficult to collect from everyone in this way and some are overlooked. But the boys claim that numbers who were asked to contribute to the expense fund refused. This is not right. If a person is willing to be amused, he should help pay for his own and others' amusements. The ball team is not rich—they are in need of funds, and if they have to pay all or most of the expense of bringing out side teams here, they will soon go "broke" and disband. They are beginning to play ball now and should be encouraged by popular support to do their best.

In the game played last Saturday between the Mosier school and Rev. D. V. Poling's team of Sunday School boys, the Mosier kids lost out by a score of 2 to 11. Those S. S. lads can sure play ball. Mr. Poling says that in a few years he will match them against any team in the state.

ORIGIN OF ARTESIAN WATER

Whence comes artesian water? It is believed by many persons that artesian water is stored up in the depths of the earth in great reservoirs or exists as mysterious underground rivers which eventually find their way to the surface. It is true that the water is stored up in underground reservoirs, but not as popularly supposed. With the exception of a few caverns of comparatively small extent such reservoirs bear no relation to open basins of the surface type, but are as a rule rock strata masses in which the only opening are spaces between the grain or along lines of solution, planes of jointing, cleavage, or bedding, or other fissures.

The probable source of underground waters has been widely discussed, and while every one would doubtless agree that by far the greater part is derived from rainfall, there is considerable variation of opinion as to the relative importance of other sources, such as seepage or absorption of water from the ocean, or the release of otherwise unavailable waters in the earth's crust which have been set free by physical or chemical exclusion.

FIRST CHERRIES FOR MOSIER
