County School Superintendent Justus T. NeT has appointed the Educational board of Wasco county under the provisions of the new supervisory law which was passed at the session of state legislature last winter and which became a law May 18. He has named the following who will serve with himself: F. M. Gill, of Dufur; Clyde T. Bonney, Tygh Valley; Mrs. Jessie M. Britton, Boyd; Miss Elizabeth C. Stevens, The Dalles. This board will hold a meeting in The Dalles Wednesday, May 31, when the county will be divided into districts and a supervisor or supervisors appointed and make regulations as regards supervisors' work. The superintendent is to be one of these and as there cannot be less than twenty schools in a district and Wasco county contains but sixty-four schools, there will probably be but one extra supervisor appointed. The supervisors are to receive \$1000 per annum for their services and are expected to have general oversight of the schools of their district.—Dalles Optimist.
