Have a State Land Inspector.

Having read both articles in the Portland papers about the future of Oregon as regards the eastern people making investments here in either fruit or grain land given protection from unscrupulous land company's sales agents, I would suggest that the various commercial organizations in the state club together and employ a man whose capabilities in that line of work would be such that he would be competent to pass his unbiased judgment on any such property placed on sale.

Have a rule or law passed that would compel any company offering a plat of land for sale to furnish the land inspector a full and complete report of the condition of such land with all information necessary for the careful guidance of anyone wanting to purchase. Also, the land salesmen file a duplicate copy of their land with the secretary of the commercial organization nearest to the location of the land. The Commercial Club could then make a reliable report on said land to the inquirer and also to the land agent.

At the next meeting of our legislature it would be a good idea to have such an office created with proper and just laws as would bring to such a proposition and by the experiment being taken up by the clubs now, they would derive such experience that at the time the legislature would meet they would have almost a perfect idea of what would be a good and safe law to convince the eastern man that when he buys land in Oregon that he is getting something that is worth what he pays for it, and will produce crops successfully according to what is to be planted.

The Dalles Business Men's Association have been doing some work to protect the unguided buyer, and as the Portland Commercial Club is getting behind this movement, we feel more encouraged and we can see how well our state can be placed in such a position that the irresponsible schemer who has no interest in the welfare and future of Oregon will have to give way to men of honest propositions and stability.

This work cannot be outlined in a day or a week, but eventually will become perfected, and Oregon will be a state to point to that is not afraid to tell the people what is good or bad.
