Protect the Forests.

That the forest fire season of 1911 approaches with better laws and stronger patrols than were in effect at the beginning of last season, but that the last general rains cannot be counted on to postpone danger beyond June, is the substance of a statement issued today by the Western Forestry & Conservation Association...

Rainfall was about normal during May and April but light in March and February, so the total from New Years to date is less than 1910. While May rains relieved the fear of another abnormally early fire season, they also prevented the burning of settlers' and loggers' slashings at the safest time...

All the timber owners' associations are making their patrols more efficient than ever before. In Idaho forces have been out since May 1 extending trails and telephone system and some associations already have a man to every 16,000 acres.

The Washington association has its men looking after the cleaning up of dangerous slashings and rights of way and has purchased much new equipment including automobiles for transporting men and supplies.

Forest officials of all the states are arranging for stricter enforcement of the fire laws than in previous years and promise little leniency to offenders. The Washington and Oregon laws were made more stringent by the last legislation...

The Western Forestry & Conservation Association is making special effort to secure public cooperation with all these agencies by distributing immense quantities of posters, stickers and folders calling attention to the laws, the steps necessary to prevent fires, and the injury to the community caused by destruction of resources, life and property.

You are hereby notified that John Burtchett, who gives Mosier, Oregon, as his post-office address, did on March 21, 1911, file in this office his duly corroborated application to contest and secure the cancellation of your homestead, Serial No. 012688, made October 19, 1908, for [NSW] Section 3, Township 2 N., Range 11 E., Willamette Meridian, and as grounds for his contest he alleges that said entryman has wholly abandoned said land and been absent therefrom for over one year last past that said land is in its natural condition, fenced on one side only, open to the public range and has never been cultivated.

You are, therefore, further notified that the said allegations will be taken by this office as having been confessed by you, and your said entry will be canceled thereunder without your further right to be heard therein, either before this office or on appeal, if you fail to file in this office within twenty days after the FOURTH publication of this notice, as shown below, your answer, under oath, specifically meeting and responding to these allegations of contest, or if you fail within that time to file in this office due proof that you served a copy of your answer on said contestant either in person or by registered mail. If this service is made by the delivery of a copy of your answer to the contestant in person, proof of such service must be either the said contestant's written acknowledgement of his receipt of the copy, showing the date of its receipt, or the affidavit of the person by whom the delivery was made stating when and where the copy was delivered; if made by registered mail, proof of such service must consist of the affidavit of the person by whom the copy was mailed stating when and the post office to which it was mailed, and this affidavit must be accompanied by the postmaster's receipt for the letter.
