OUR PORTLAND LETTER

PORTLAND, ORE., July 16—Banks of the state show good gains in deposits and resources as compared with similar figures compiled last year.

The Central Oregon Development League is exceedingly active, even though a very young organization. Having been formed about one week ago, it is already making plans for the next meeting of the organization early in the fall and J. J. Hill will be invited to attend.

Medford business men will make a four-days' excursion through Southern Oregon some time this month, visiting Lakeview and Klamath Falls as well as a number of other points.

Union and Willamette counties will probably form a two-county development league for mutual help. It is believed that greater benefits will come to the northwest corner of the state with organization and that greater gains will be made in immigration.

After visiting 45 towns of Eastern Oregon, J. J. Sayer, field secretary to the Oregon Development League, is back at the Portland office, much impressed by

his trip through the interior. He is enthusiastic about the possibilities and the future in store for Eastern Oregon. Mr. Sayer starts this week for a similar trip through the coast counties.

The Mazamas, the mountain-climbing club of Portland, will scale Glacier Peak, in the Chelan country, Washington, this year. The annual outing is scheduled for August 2 to 20.

After nearly three years' work, the first two miles of the Celilo canal have been completed by the construction firm having the contract. This includes the upper end of the canal and Celilo Lock.

Esperantists of the Northwest will meet in Portland from July 19 to 21 under the auspices of the local Esperanto club. The meetings will be held in the convention hall of the Commercial Club.

The best list of early closing entries ever made for the races scheduled for the State Fair next September has been secured and the meet will be full of interest as well as to all who like to see spirited contests of this kind.

IMPROVEMENTS AT FAIR GROUNDS

New Buildings To Be Ready For District Fair Here This Fall

The Dalles Driving Park board met last evening at the Business Men's association building to discuss plans for the rearrangement of the driving park west of the city for the annual fair of the Second Eastern Oregon Agricultural society which will be held four days of the first week in October.

The old stock barns are being torn down and the racing stables will also be razed. The plan is to erect new quarters with better accommodations. The style of the new building under consideration will follow closely those being built by fair associations in eastern states, giving more room for each individual horse and extending the roof in front in such a manner as to make a porch under which may be stored feed, also giving ample sleeping quarters for the attendants.

The old stables were arranged in such a manner that it took from two to three stalls for each horse, one stall for the horse, another for the attendants' sleeping quarters. The stalls for stock will be built on the same plan.

The buildings under consideration include a general exhibit structure with dimensions of about 40 by 120 feet and a building for the use of exhibitors alone. These structures will be substantially constructed and made as nearly dust and fire proof as possible. The grandstand will be moved back from the track at least 12 feet and improved and enlarged. The judges' stand will be erected in such manner as to give the spectators a full view of the finish of races.

The initial expense of making these extensive improvements will be heavy, but it is hoped that within a few years the fair will be upon a self-supporting basis and that it will relieve the merchants of The Dalles from the necessity of raising a large sum of money each year. The stockholders in the Dalles City Driving Park association are business men who have contributed a large sum of money for the purchase of the grounds and they do not expect full returns

Speaks Well for Mosier.

With the close of the strawberry season in the Mosier district there are some very interesting figures available. While the early berries did not do so well owing to a very backward spring, the returns were very satisfactory. The market was firm all during the season for the first-class fruit, such as produced in the Mosier and Hood River districts, and prices were much above the average.

Mosier berries this year were shipped into Washington, Idaho, Wyoming, Utah, Colorado, South Dakota and Illinois, the records showing that 62 cities in seven different states received Mosier berries and were willing to pay a much better price for the product than the home-grown berries.—Hood River News.

After September 1, next, school children and the traveling public must furnish their own drinking cups. Individual communion cups have long been in use in many churches and should be used in all.
