The Passing of Mrs. Ireland.

Mrs. Ruth Hinton Ireland died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. V. C. Young, in Mosier, last Friday night, at a ripe old age of 78 years, death being caused by a complication of troubles. She had been ill for some time and confined to her bed for several weeks. For about five days she was unconscious and remained so until her death. She was surrounded by her family and a few friends who were faithful to the last in administering to her comfort. The funeral was held on Saturday afternoon from the Immanuel Church, the services being conducted by Rev. J. H. Hargraves, of Hood River, assisted by Rev. W. A. Stark and Rev. K. H. Sickafosse. Funeral Director S. E. Bartmess, of Hood River, had charge of the burial, which was held in Odd Fellows Cemetery. The services were attended by a large number of friends who had known and loved "Grandma" Ireland in life.

Ruth Hinton was born September 6th, 1832, in Monroe county, Ill. In 1849 she was married to Evan Evans. To this union were born three children, John, Mary and Edward, the two brothers surviving. While the children were still small Mr. Evans was accidentally killed, and in 1859 Mrs. Evans married Mr. George Ireland. To this last union were born seven children, Mrs. Nellie Young, of Mosier, being the only surviving child, and with whom she made her home since the death of her husband, which occurred over a year ago.

In 1867 Mrs. Ireland went to Missouri where she lived until 1892, when she came to Oregon, settling in this locality. In 1874 she united with the Baptist Church, her life and work testifying to her Christian character. It is said of her by those who knew her that her life was full of good acts and of usefulness to the neighborhood in which she lived. Besides bringing up her large family, she reared the three children of her son Edward—Alfred, Paul and Eddie, of whom she was very fond.

Many people in Mosier District have reason to feel grateful to "Grandma" Ireland in the early days of settlement, when neighbors were few and the kindnesses and favors she was always ready and glad to show ment much to them. Some of those people are no longer here, but those remaining will ever cherish in loving remembrance her many virtues.
