Big Fire at The Dalles

A disastrous fire occurred at The Dalles last Sunday night, when the Wasco Milling Co's mill was burned, valued at \$120,000, together with the Great Southern depot, valued at \$20,000, rolling stock of the O. W. R. & N. Co., the stock yards, several freight sheds, section house and a quantity of hay. The fire is supposed to have been caused by defective wiring in the mill. The estimated loss is \$200,000, with a partial insurance.
