CRY OF "FIRE" STARTS PANIC

False Alarm Causes Death at Moving Picture Show.

Crazed Crowd Stumbles and Blocks Doorway—Many Trample on Bodies of Fallen.

Canonsburg, Pa.—Twenty-six persons were suffocated or trampled to death, 25 were seriously injured and 30 were less severely hurt at a senseless panic at a moving picture show in the Canonsburg opera house, according to revised figures.

How foolish the panic was developed fully when those involved related just what occurred.

There was no fire. The fatal rush at the exit was due to baseless fear.

It developed that not even a spark flashed. The film broke with a snapping noise and a bright light was thrown on the screen. A frightened boy imagined a fire and unconsciously shouted out the death knell of more than a score of persons as he started to rush for the exit.

Polus Dubrowski, a huge miner, jumped from his seat and ran for the same exit. In a moment there was a fighting, struggling mass after him.

At the head of a narrow stairway, which leads to the street, the miner tripped. As he rolled down the stairs, he swept from their feet many persons who were waiting their turn to enter the theater. Soon there was a horrible pile of men, women and children at the foot of the steps. Dubrowski probably was the first person killed.

Firemen, policemen and level-headed persons untangled the human mass. The unhurt and those slightly injured were pulled from the top of the pile. As they gained the street, they ran about screaming like maniacs. The seriously injured were sent home or taken to nearby hospitals.

Coroner Hoffman has begun a rigid investigation. Measurements made by the coroner's jury showed the stairway leading to the door of the opera house to be only six feet and a half wide, while the doorway at the bottom is not more than eight feet high.

It is customary for the management of the theater to give two or three performances each evening, and the moving picture machine operator was about to complete the first session when a film parted. Some of the audience had begun to leave the building, and others were on the stairway coming up, when Dubrowski began his wild flight. When the doorway was being filled up, others walked over the bodies of the fallen and breaking the glass transom over the door, crawled through and dropped into the street.

BUG WITH SCENT ARRIVES.
 Odoriferous Insect Pays Coast Regular Summer Visit.

Portland, Or.—A species of the heteropterous branch of the great hemiptera class has made its reappearance in Portland. People who do not care if they hurt the feelings of the insect refer to him generally as the "stinkbug."

In their former visit the insects appeared in such great numbers that they made life fairly miserable for sensitive persons.

This summer the odoriferous bug has made his reappearance at several of the summer resorts, taking especial pleasure apparently in coming round and breaking up pleasant parties assembled about the campfires at night.

In Portland a number of them have been noticed lately in stores, in some of the saloons and in a few cases in the parkways. They are a simple appearing bug, done in quiet colors, gray or black, but they won't stand for annoyance, and if one inadvertently disturbs them they retaliate by making the circumbient atmosphere sufficiently uncomfortable for all concerned.

Heirs to Fortune Work.
 Spokane, Wash.—Two Spokane men, Alvin Davis, of East 1611 Fifth avenue, and his brother, of East 2923 Second avenue, have each inherited in the neighborhood of \$100,000 out of an English fortune, estimated at between \$6,000,000 and \$7,000,000. Though they have been informed of the fact and are daily expecting the receipt of their funds, Lon Davis went to work as usual this week at his carpenter trade and his brother continues to drive a hardware delivery wagon.

Longest Flight Made.
 Mournful, France—M. Helles, a young French aviator, broke the records for a single continuous long flight, in competition for the Michelin cup. He recovered 1,200 kilometers (746 miles) in 15 hours. The previous record for the Michelin cup was made by Jules Vedrines last year, when he covered 800 kilometers in 7 hours 55 minutes and 35 seconds. Helles flew over a measured course and landed at Châlons-sur-Marne. The prize is the sum of \$4,000 and a bronze copy of an object of art costing \$2,000.

Captain Leaves Sing Sing.
 New York—Captain William Van Schaick, 72 years old, commander of the excursion steamer General Slocum when it burned in Hell Gate June 15 1904, with a loss of a thousand lives, mostly women and children, was paroled by the United States government. He returned to his home immediately from Sing Sing prison. He was sentenced to 10 years' imprisonment and had served 24 years when paroled.

Wave Takes and Givcs.
 New York—The following brief entry in the log of the steamer Indra, which has just arrived here from Far Eastern ports, tells how Gul Mamud, a Hindu, was saved from a watery grave:

"August 12, 8 p. m.—Native fireman washed overboard forward and washed back aft; rescued by carpenter."

 New South Wales, Australia, since the advent of woman suffrage, has proceeded upon the principle that nothing is too good for the women—except for those who are being deprived of their liberty. The new penitentiary for women at Long Bay is probably the most up-to-date, comfortable, and even luxurious, place of its kind in the world. It is fitted up with hot and cold baths, with well ventilated cells painted in pleasing colors, electric lighted and stocked with suitable reading matter. The prisoners are graded according to the most advanced ideas and special privileges are awarded for good behavior. The wardresses are all educated and refined women, and a committee of ladies of Sydney has charge of those who are discharged from the prison. Gardening, dressmaking, cooking and washing are taught.

If incarceration is supposed to be an example to wrong-doers, there is undoubtedly a point at which comfort and luxury in prisons may be carried too far. On the other hand, it is doubtful whether anyone is ever injured by kind treatment if intelligently directed. The Australian state has set a good pace in regarding these unfortunate women as in need of treatment rather than of punishment. Long Bay is a moral and physical hospital; not, in the strict sense, a penitentiary.—Success Magazine.

The Costly Monroe Doctrine.
 It would be interesting if somebody would calculate how much it has cost Uncle Sam to perform his presumed obligations as guarantor of the Monroe Doctrine. In 1898 he fought a war, "freed" Cuba, and acquired various colonial liabilities. That war introduced him into the first circles of world powers, and the effort
