A Good Suggestion

Altho automobiles are becoming quite numerous in Mosier many horses do not take kindly to them. In fact, there is always grave danger of serious accidents resulting from too close proximity to the autos on narrow grades. The danger might be lessened considerably, as was suggested the other day by a lady, if the custom should become universally observed, of the team taking the inside of the road in passing autos. In case horses became fractious, the danger of backing off or being thrown over an embankment, would be reduced to the minimum.

Fever in plants.

Not only animals but plants may suffer and die of fevers, is the conclusion reached by the French savant Du Sablon. When a human being has a fever he loses flesh on account of the increased combustion, the quantity of carbonic acid respired from the lungs being augmented from 70 to 100 per cent. A plant attacked by fever, which may be caused by a wound, rapidly consumes its reserves of organic matter and becomes enfeebled, sometimes sufficiently to cause its death. Du Sablon has experimented with potatoes rendered feverish by cutting them. The temperature soon rises about one degree, and the quantity of carbonic acid given off increases several hundred per cent. If the potato survives, its "respiration" after a few days becomes normal, but it falls into an enfeebled state, resembling that of a person convalescent from a long fever.—Scientific American.
