OUR PORTLAND LETTER

Portland, Or., Sept. 7. (Special) Steps have been taken by Central Oregon people to exploit one of the greatest resources of the region that has heretofore been neglected. This is the useful horse.

The object is to establish a big horse market, where breeders will come in touch with buyers and find fair prices for their stock.

The outside buyer, it is believed, will come to a sale where he can pick from a bunch of 400 or 500 head, when if he has to travel from ranch to ranch, he is not attracted.

Bigger prizes and better exhibits than ever before are expected to bring crowds to the annual apple show to be held in Portland November 15-17. The apple crop of the state is excellent, and it thought the various fruit districts will make a splendid showing.

Irrigationists of Oregon will meet in Ontario September 28 and 29, during the progress of the Malheur County Fair. The State Irrigation Association has called a meeting on those dates and there promises to be a large attendance from all parts of Oregon.

When the gates of the State Fair swing open on September 11 for four-days meet, visitors will find conditions on the grounds vastly improved. A number of alterations that make for the comfort and convenience of visitors have been made.

Around The World in Sixteen Minutes.

For the purpose of determining the time it would take to accomplish the feat, the New York Times, the other day, forwarded a message of nine words, around the world by wire.

It took exactly sixteen and one half minutes for the message to make the journey of 28,913 miles overland and under the seas of the two hemispheres. In that time it had passed

through the hands of eighteen different agencies, operating land and sub-marine lines in the new and old world, traversed the United States, and touched at the Hawaiian Islands, Guan, the Philippines, China, two parts of India, Africa, Spain and the Azores.

The experiment has a special significance in view of the fact that fifty-four years this month, Cyrus W. Fields, saw his dream of electrical communication between England and the United States realized in the successful laying of the first Atlantic cable and the transmission of messages between the two widely separated nations.

With its aid Dewey was able to notify the world of the sinking of the Spanish Armada under Montojo, 7500 miles away in Manila Bay, an hour after that historic disaster to the Castilian in the Far East.

As we think of this marvel the picture of Nathan Rothschild, riding at a top speed on a fiery steed over night to the coast of Belgium with the first news of the defeat of Napoleon at Waterloo and its dispatch by boat and relays of trusted carriers, every forty miles from Dover to London, unconsciously looms before us, as a ghost of the wistful past.

From the introductions of the cable dates most of those electrical engineering and other marvels which have since stirred the imagination of the progressive and thoughtful. Since then Alexandria Graham Bell has given us the telephone, Edison, the wonders of the electric light, the wonders of the electric light, the wonders of the electric light.
