This question is being asked by people in Mosier, Hood River and Portland. There should be but one answer and that one exhibit—certainly, Mosier will exhibit at the Portland Apple Show next month. Mosier claims to raise as fine apples as any section in the Northwest. The claim has been made good many times. We know we can raise them, other sections know it, the lovers of good apples in New York and foreign countries know it, for they have eaten them. Why, then, hide our light under a bushel? We had a good exhibit at Portland last year and beyond question should have this year and every year we have a chance prove to the world the excellence of our products. We have nothing to be ashamed of and everything to be proud of. True, our apple crop this year is light as it is in other sections; but the quality is as good as the best and the growers should make an effort to show our goods. So far as we know, Mosier has not as yet asked for space for an exhibit, but we should get busy at once and secure a good position in the exhibit building at Portland and then proceed without delay to arrange for the best display that has ever been sent from the district.

It strikes us that the Fruit Association and the Commercial Club should get together on this project and go out among the apple growers and get the promise of as many boxes as possible of their best apples for display. A competent man can be had to take charge of the exhibit and meet strangers in Portland and tell them of the country where they came from. Mosier can't afford not to have an exhibit—she owes it to herself; each individual grower owes it to himself, as a matter of pride and personal profit. It would look peculiar indeed if Mosier, making the claims she does in regard to her fruit, should fail to prove her claim at the big apple exhibit, where tens of thousands will examine the fruit from every section in Oregon and Washington. We have an exhibit in Portland? Why, certainly, and one that every Mosierite can point to with pride. So get busy, you fruit growers and you commercial club.

OUR PORTLAND LETTER

Portland, Ore., Oct. 25, (Special) A step of permanent constructive benefit was taken last Saturday night at the Portland Commercial Club, when business men gathered at a dinner to discuss the benefits of recent excursions to Klamath Falls, Central Oregon and Aberdeen, Wash. The big dining room was filled by men of affairs and the experience given and the policy outlined for future excursions were of great value.

The meeting developed into a symposium on the attitude of Portland business men to outside territory in the two states and was a survey of conditions existing from Aberdeen to Klamath and in Central Oregon. The result will be a closer tie between Portland and the outlying country and this promises to be of great aid in future development.

Redmond will hold a potato show on November 2. This is the date the O. W. R. & N. demonstration train arrives at Redmond and the two events will undoubtedly bring a very large number of farmers from the surrounding country to Redmond. At the same time a meeting of dairymen will be held to organize an association.

The joint line of the Oregon Trunk and the Deschutes Railroad will be opened to passenger and freight traffic to Bend from the Columbia River on November 1. The new lines are now operating to Opal City.

An apple tree near Albany has

been sold for \$6000. It is ever-bearing, maturing fruit at all seasons of the growing period, with buds, blossoms and apples on the tree at the same time. A nursery company has bought the tree and will try to establish a new everbearing variety. Dairymen and butter and cheese makers will gather in Portland December 6, 7, and 8 for the annual convention and special plans are under way to make this year's gathering the largest and most interesting ever held. Experts from the East will be in attendance to judge the different exhibits, of which there will be many, and well known authorities on various topics of interest will deliver addresses. There will be more and better prizes offered than ever before.

The program has just been made up for the first annual convention of the Oregon State Hotel Men's Association, which will be held in the convention hall of Portland Commercial Club on December 5 and 6. The hotel men will discuss matters of mutual interest and seek ways to increase tourist travel to this state from California and the East.

Eugene will hold its biggest apple show on November 3 and 4, the coming exhibit throwing all previous shows far in the shade. The annual fruit exhibition is growing all the time in importance because of increasing orchard acreage around Eugene, and this year the festival will take on more than local interest. Prizes have been offered that make it an object for fruit growers to compete.

Lakeview will add agriculture to its high school course as soon as its new building is finished. This is a new and important feature of the course of study and one that progressive communities are adopting.

President Elliott Urges Immigration into Oregon

Urging a greater diversion of homeseekers and tourist travel to Oregon and other North Coast states, Howard Elliott, president of the Northern Pacific Road, recently addressed the American Association of General Passenger Agent in convention at St. Paul.

"Oregon is a state of an immense extent, containing 61,887,360 acres, or a greater area than all Denmark, Holland, Belgium, Alsace-Lorraine, Luxemburg and Switzerland, with the State of Maine added," said Mr. Elliott. "Until recently its development was confined chiefly to the eastern, western and southern edges of the state and a great interior, an area of 55,000 square miles, was virtually without rail transportation," he continued.

"Within a year, the Northern Pacific, Great Northern and Union Pacific lines have all built into the central portion of the state, a region nearly as large as the states of Ohio and Illinois, containing rich and fertile lands, capable of heavy grain production, the raising of fine fruit and garden vegetables and one which for many years has been an important producer of livestock. This great area is about to be given the means by which to obtain a large population prosperously engaged in the development of its rich resources. Portland, already a metropolis of great beauty and attractiveness, is situated at the northern end of the Willamette Valley, a rich and beautiful district flanked on by the beautiful Cascade Mountains and richly favored in soil and climate.

"Plowing may be done any month in the year and stock grazes throughout the winter. The Columbia River is one of the Scenic gems of the West." Mr. Elliott continued in this strain and concluded with effective argument in favor of inducing immigration to Oregon.—Chamber of Commerce Bulletin.
