Power Firm is Enjoined

The Oregonian says a temporary injunction was granted yesterday in the United States Circuit Court by Judge Bean against the Hydro Electric Company, of Hood River, to restrain it from interfering with the electric wires of the Pacific Power & Light Company near that city.

The Hydro Electric Company was organized at Hood River to furnish that city and The Dalles with electric lights and power. To accomplish this the company built a dam across the river four and one-half miles south of Hood River, with which it generates its power. Leading thence and along the county road it has erected poles and stretched wires parallel to and at times crossing those of the Pacific Light & Power Company to the detriment of the latter's business, it is charged, by causing short circuits.

United States Marshal Scott sent a deputy to Hood River last night to serve the injunction order on the officers of the Hydro Electric Company. They are directed to appear before January 1 to show cause why the injunction should not be continued.
