Ortley Items.
Events are progressing rapidly in the new town of Ortley. Despite the inclemency of the season, a large force of carpenters are kept continually at work on the town buildings; a small army of Greeks are clearing the adjacent fields, preparatory for the spring orchard planting. Surveyors are at work staking off the land already cleared, and it is expected that the Hood River Land Company will set out at least 500 acres of commercial apples in the spring.
Five carpenters are at work on the house of J. R. Maxfield, and the work is being rushed to completion. This will be the first boarding house in Ortley and will fill a long felt need. The old Elmer Root house, an old landmark of this locality, has been moved to one of the town lots where it will be completely remodeled and used as a dwelling. The carpenters have finished remodeling the residence of L. D. Firebaugh. The house has been completely renovated, making a very cozy and attractive home. W. A. Tompkins, of Portland, has the contract for painting the new buildings, and the work is progressing rapidly.
The people of Ortley are proud to claim one of the finest school buildings in Wasco County. Spacious, well lighted, excellently constructed and finished, it is indeed a credit to the town. On the opening day Dec. 4th, a seven or eight months continuous term began, with an enrollment of 16 pupils. Miss Royala Loomis, of Portland, has charge of the school. On the evening of December 2nd, the townspeople assembled at the school where they enjoyed a pleasant evening in the nature of a housewarming. About 40 people were in attendance.
Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Fields have recently returned from Portland, where they have been purchasing furniture for their commodious new home. Mr. Fields is constructing a full cement basement and sidewalk, which work is being directed by the cement construction expert, Cass Fields, of Portland.
L. E. Adels has purchased twenty acres of Mosier View Orchards, and has given the contract for the erection of a three thousand dollar colonial house to be completed by April 1st, 1912.
