OUR PORTLAND LETTER

Portland, Ore., Jan. 9. (Special) Land Shows and exhibits of Oregon products in the East during the Winter have had a widespread effect, according to those in close touch with the exhibits.

The great Northern has done a splendid work this season, as it did last, in operating exhibit cars through the Middle West, taking a collection of Oregon products to the farmers so they might see what is grown here and learn of the state's agricultural opportunities at first hand.

Retail merchants in the state will gather at Medford January 17 and 18 for the 6th annual convention. The program has been made up and is filled with discussions of subjects of vital interest to the merchant.

The Forest Service is mapping the forests of the state, and will show the ownership of each piece of standing timber of any account in Oregon. By this means it is expected to increase the efficiency of the present system of fire protection during the dry periods of the year when the annual loss reaches a big sum.

The Southern Pacific Traffic department will encourage farmers in the Willamette Valley and Western Oregon to grow barley as a feed for dairy stock and to fatten hogs and cattle. To farmers who will plant an acre or two experimentally, the railroad company offers to supply the seed.

The Agricultural College recommends barley as a stock feed, believing that when grown extensively it will become as valuable for that purpose here as corn is in the Middle West.

Progress is being made in the campaign to interest children in agricultural education in Oregon. State Superintendent Alderman is sending out letters to breeders and producers of the state asking for prizes to be awarded to school pupils who shall make the best exhibits of farm products at the fairs next fall.

Mayor Henderson of Astoria is encouraging a public market for the city by the sea, emphasizing the need for such an institution in his annual message to the council. He believes it will reduce the cost of living by bringing the producer and consumer together.

Oregon editors will visit the Pendleton Roundup next Fall in a body. The plan is to take the scribes by special train from Portland, where the annual convention will be held, to Pendleton for the two final days of the Roundup. On the Sunday following the editors will probably be guests at Hot Lake.

One Cent Postage.

One-cent letter postage is inevitable, according to officers of the United States Postoffice Department.

James J. Britt, Assistant Postmaster General, speaking at Cleveland on behalf of Postmaster General Hitchcock and the Department, declared definitely and emphatically that just as soon as a readjustment of postal rates can be brought about one-cent postage will be possible.

The government is making an average profit of sixty-five cents per year on every man, woman and child in the United States, according to General Britt, through the postal department on the carrying of letters. The department's actual profit is carefully estimated at \$62,031,990.65.

"You pay more than ninety cents per pound for carrying letters about the United States although it costs less than half that sum to transport them," says General Britt. "To correct this manifest injustice we intend to ask Congress to lower first class mail from two cents to one cent and to so adjust other classes as to put them on a cost-paying basis."

"I certainly believe that one-cent letter postage will pay if other rates are adjusted. During the fiscal year of 1911 the government made a profit of \$62,031,990.65 on first class mail. On third class mail it made a profit of \$182,184.29, while on fourth class there was a surplus of \$6,601,574."—Chamber of Commerce Bulletin.

Replanting Forests.

The United States forestry service has in full working order at Wyeth, a dryer and huller which is used in drying, hulling and cleaning the fir and pine cones and seeds from other forest trees which are being gathered in carload lots all over the Pacific northwest. These seeds are being used to replant the burned over forest districts. A force of 15 men is at work and the work goes on day and night and from 4 to 10 carloads of seeds are being handled every 24 hours.

A. P. Bateham of Mosier, president of the Oregon State Horticultural Society, spent a couple of days in town the latter part of the week, being interested in the proposition of consolidating the four fruit sections of the northwest in one central selling agency.—Hood River News.
