Horticultural Society Meets.

Upon Saturday the twentieth, with a record breaking attendance, the Mosier Horticultural Society held its first meeting of the year. The meeting was called to order by J. P. Carroll who announced that the election of officers for the ensuing year was in order. The following were elected: J. P. Carroll, President, F. A. Shogren, Vice President, Hugo E. Birken, Secretary, R. M. Ross, Treasurer.

Following the election of officers it was tentatively decided to hold the meeting on Thursday here after and the hour was set for 11 o'clock. Next Thursday, January 27th, the subject for discussion will be sprays and spraying and on Thursday, February first, The Care of Snow Injured Trees. The latter topic is one of vital importance to all those whose young orchards were damaged by the recent snow crust. From this discussion the members may go home with the best advice of the most able and experienced apple growers in the district.

After all business of the society was attended to Mr. Bateham gave an extended talk upon the proposed cooperative plan to buy a controlling interest in the North West Fruit Exchange. He reviewed past attempts at forming a central selling agency and took up Mr. Miller's proposal, a copy of which was published in these columns last week. The speaker brought out the fact that this was strictly a growers' move and demonstrated the method for placing apples upon the market thru the exchange, also how the quotations for the season prices were made. At the conclusion of Mr. Bateham's arguments the following resolutions were unanimously adopted by the fruit growers present.

The Fruit Growers of Mosier believe in cooperation and would carry it to the farthest extent practical.

The proposition that Mosier sell its fruit through the same channel that other districts of the Northwest use, we believe to be practical.

We readily understand that no one district can maintain as comprehensive and efficient a sales organization as a combination of districts could.

The same holds true in regard to the exploiting of new markets.

Believing as we do that Mosier produces and packs the finest apples in the world, we would welcome such a wide opportunity to demonstrate it through the extensive sales system of the Northwestern Fruit Exchange, by which all fruit is sold on its own merits.

Therefore be it resolved: that we heartily endorse the so-called "Rogue River Plan" of merging the selling interests of several of the principal fruit districts of Oregon and Washington, by jointly purchasing a controlling interest in the Northwestern Fruit Exchange.

Resolved further: that we favor having the Mosier Fruit Grower's Association affiliate with the Northwestern Fruit Exchange whenever it is assured that enough other fruit interests will agree so that the control may be held by fruit growers.

Resolved: that A. J. Bateham be appointed a representative to confer with any representatives that may be selected by other fruit sections, to formulate for adoption, definite and detailed plans for the accomplishment of the above purposes.

OF GREAT VALUE.

The meetings which the horticultural Society are holding this winter are of incalculable value to everyone interested in fruit raising. They should be considered especially valuable to the orchardist who is perhaps just beginning the work, as he can obtain the very information necessary to his success by

simply becoming a member, attending regularly and asking for the information he wants. These he gets for nothing—information that has cost those who can give it, years of hard work, study and many discouragements. Indeed, the beginner in fruit culture should consider himself particularly fortunate in securing this information in a few hours instead of having to spend years digging it out for himself. We would urge that every man in Mosier who owns land, should join the society.

Wells Bell For District Attorney.

The Dalles Chronicle says that W. A. Bell has filed his petition with the secretary of state as a republican candidate at the primaries, April 19, for the office of district attorney for the seventh judicial district, comprising Crook, Hood River and Wasco counties.

Mr. Bell has been a resident of the district for the past 25 years, 18 of which he has been in the active practice of law at Prineville, Crook county, and for the past two years at The Dalles, although retaining an extensive practice in Crook county. He has served 16 years as a deputy district attorney, having served during all the terms that A. A. Jayne and Frank Menefee held the office, and a portion of the term of Fred W. Wilson, the present district attorney.

The candidate says that if he is nominated and elected to the office that he will give the duties of the office his personal and first consideration to the exclusion of other law business, and will make it an object to often visit each county, looking after and attending to business of the office, and assisting the officers in the enforcement of the law, and especially the law to put down vice, immoral acts, and the traffic in white slavery. He further deems the salary of the office sufficient so that whoever is elected should employ his time to the duties of the office instead of making the duties of the office a secondary consideration. Mr. Bell served as judge of Crook county for four years, 1904 to 1908, and by reason of his long residence and acquaintance with the people of the district, and his long experience in the practice of the law, he should make an efficient and able district attorney.

We would add that we have known Mr. Bell personally for the past 14 years and believe him to be a clean man in every respect and well qualified for the office of District Attorney.—Ed.

CANDIDATES GET BUSY.

Candidates for county honors are beginning to be heard from. So far six have made announcement of candidacy for county offices and two for district and congressional honors. Of the latter, J. P. Rusk, of La Grande, is out for congress, and W. A. Bell, of The Dalles, for District Attorney.

Of the aspirants for county offices, who have announced their aspirations, are L. B. Fox, for county clerk, Levi Christman for Sheriff, W. A. Davis, of The Dalles, for Assessor C. J. Littlepage, of Mosier, for County Commissioner, F. A. Gunning, of The Dalles, for County Judge, and Clyde F. Bonney, of Tygh Valley, for County School Superintendent. Naturally the voters of Mosier precinct are particularly interested in the candidate from their own locality. Mr. Littlepage is well and favorably known here, and it is the general belief among the voters that he is well qualified to represent the interests of his own district and the entire county in a fair and impartial manner. Mosier, or the west end of Wasco county, is entitled to representation at the county seat and Mr. Littlepage should have the hearty support of his own precinct and that of the county ticket generally.

OUR PORTLAND LETTER

Portland, Ore., Jan. 16, (Special) A permanent state organization that will have considerable influence on Oregon affairs is promised through the formation of the Oregon Irrigation Congress, which has been called for February 19, 20 and 21 in the convention hall of the Portland Commercial Club. All interested in irrigation are urged to attend and suggestions will be welcomed. The purpose of the congress is to have an effective organization to deal with irrigation questions and to secure the rights Oregon feels itself entitled to from the Federal Government.

Indications are that there will be a big attendance from all parts of the state. Government officials and irrigation experts from all parts of the state will be invited and the proposed organization promises to make itself very useful to Oregon in the work of future development.

A conference held at the Oregon Agricultural College on Monday of this week between the different interests that are working for agricultural education in the state schools resulted in partially outlining the course of study. Livestock interests of Portland have arranged to send out an expert hog raiser over the state to interest boys in raising hogs. This will be a part of the agricultural work of the schools and contests will be arranged, various classes meet in a county contest and the winners of these, in turn, will exhibit at the State Fair.

An Oregon hop farm has been sold for \$130,000. This was the well known Krebs farm near Independence, consisting of 400 acres of excellent hop land, together with all necessary equipment. The buyers, an English company, will continue raising hops on the tract.

La Grande business men have been getting better acquainted

with their state by participating in a special excursion that took them all over the main railway lines of Western and Southern Oregon. The excursionists chartered a special car and traveled in comfort, being entertained at the principal points along their journey.

What is probably the largest mobilization of troops ever undertaken in this country in time of peace will be that in the Klamath Basin the coming Summer. United states regulars and state militia forces are to be gathered for manoeuvres. The ground selected for the big camp is about 50 miles north of Klamath Falls, near the Klamath Indian Reservation and convenient to Crater Lake National Park and the Cascade Forest Reserve.

Wenatchee will send a committee of fruit growers to Portland to confer with representatives of other districts of Oregon and Washington to formulate a better selling plan for the combined products of the leading fruit growing sections. It is hoped by consolidation of interests to perfect a selling agency that shall bring about a better system of distribution than has been in use heretofore.

A new perennial clover, of the alsike species, is reported from Tillamook County where it was first discovered. Experiments are being made with it and it is claimed it yields enormous tonnage to the acre, while it grows the year around. The clover has no seed, bloom or sex and is propagated by cutting up the plant and sowing the pieces. The department of agriculture will make an investigation of the new plant.

A rock and earth slide this side of the tunnel between Mosier and Hood River last Wednesday morning, delayed the morning local several hours. The section gang removed the obstruction with dynamite, pick and shovel.

Erhart-Hughes Nuptials.

The Mosier public was given quite a surprise last Saturday evening at the basket ball game when it was whispered about that Mr. Julius P. Erhart and Mrs. Anna Hughes had been quietly married in the afternoon at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. J. N. Mosier, Rev. Mr. Hargreaves performing the ceremony. Only a few relatives of the bride, beside Mr. and Mrs. J. N. Mosier, witnessed the ceremony.

Mr. Erhart is quite well known here, having until recently been proprietor of the Hotel Pines. Mrs. Hughes is well known here and in The Dalles, being an old resident of Mosier and a daughter of Mrs. Robert Dunsmore and at present proprietor of the hotel.

The Bulletin adds its felicitation to those of the happy couples, many friends.
