EDUCATIONAL MEETING SUCCESS.

The Educational and Country Life Meeting, held last Friday afternoon at Stroup's Hall, was participated in by the teachers and pupils of Mosier school and of District No. 8, and many residents of the town and country. Nearly all of the business houses in town were closed during the meeting. Great enthusiasm was manifested by all and the audience was greatly inspired by the remarks of the different speakers.

Miss Evelyn Nebendahl's original paper on "How to Improve Country Life" was an exceptionally good one and we regret that lack of space prevents our reproducing it this week in these columns. We will take pleasure in doing so later.

Rev. Mr. Hargreaves' remarks on "Back to the Land" were very impressive and entertaining. He dwelt particularly on the advantages the dwellers in the country have in so many ways over those whose lives are spent in the cities and large towns. "Back to the Land" was the theme of all the speakers, among whom were Dr. R. M. Ross, H. M. Scearce, J. E. Johnson, J. T. Neff and N. C. Maris, of Portland.

Prof. Neff aroused much enthusiasm by the statement that Mosier could in all probability have a high school and it was the expressed sentiment of the audience that steps be at once taken to secure such an institution. Each speaker dwelt on the importance of such a school for Mosier and the convenience it would be to pupils in the surrounding country who could practically live at home and get the benefit of the higher schooling.

Mr. Maris, of the Union Stock Yards of Portland, urged the school children to enter the contest for prizes for the best of anything grown or made by them. His remarks created much interest among them.

One particular thing this meeting accomplished was to bring a large number of the people together in friendly intercourse. Individual interest is strong enough in this community, but community interest is sadly lacking. Get together meetings like this one of last Friday, and the one to be held next Monday night, will create a feeling of unanimity and bind the people together in a strong neighborhood and brotherhood fellowship and co-partnership of community interests.

TO ENTERTAIN ADDISON BENNETT.

The citizens of Mosier District will have the pleasure of meeting and entertaining Mr. Addison (Rabbitville) Bennett next Monday night at Lamb's Hall. Mr. Bennett, as is well known, has been traveling thru Oregon writing up the different sections of the state. His letters in the Oregonian have been read with much interest, not only by Oregonians, but by thousands of people, many of them with their eyes and thought turned Westward, in the East and Middle West. Mr. Bennett has an interesting and graphic style of expressing his impressions of the country thru which he travels and we can truthfully say that he doesn't peddle "hot air," but states facts as he finds them.

The object of Mr. Bennett's visit to Mosier is to secure accurate information as to the resources of the district and a few good photos of some of our orchards with which to illustrate his letter. This letter will appear in the Sunday edition of the Oregonian and will be as widely read as others have been.

It is earnestly desired that every man in the district be present at this meeting, and it is particularly requested that any and every one who can give

general or specific information which Mr. Bennett will want, will make an effort to come. This means much to Mosier, as by the letter which he will write Mosier will gain more publicity than she could in any other way. It is planned to give a banquet or "stag party" to welcome Mr. Bennett. Each individual pays for his own plate, which will cost seventy-five cents. In order to know how many there will be to provide for, it will be necessary for those wishing to attend to signify their intentions as soon as possible. Notifications can be made at the bank, to J. OUR PORTLAND LETTER

Portland, Ore., Feb. 13, (Special) Reports from various points in the state indicate that the Country Life Education Week movement, as outlined by State Superintendent Alderman and the Oregon Development League, is being observed very generally and is arousing much enthusiasm.

The Salem Commercial Club celebrated with a farmer's dinner at the Hotel Marion on Thursday. The entire afternoon was given up to addresses and discussions by members of the Board of Trade and visiting farmers of the county. Governor West and President Kerr, of the Oregon Agricultural College, were the principal speakers.

At Dayton the Commercial Club appointed Miss Harriet Starr, secretary of the club, to organize the work with the principals and teachers of the schools and to interest the parents in the work.

At Klamath Falls the county and city superintendents of schools and members of the Commercial Club joined in a public meeting to plan for the garden competition named. A public meeting was held on Thursday afternoon.

The Baker Commercial Club made the subject a special order of business at its meeting Wednesday evening. On Friday evening of Country Life Education Week the farmers of Sherman County gave a banquet to the merchants of Moro to which the business men of The Dalles and Portland were invited. Only Sherman County products were served at the dinner.

At Portland the committee on garden contests in the public schools arranged for two contests, one for early vegetables and one for later varieties. A special exhibition will be held in the Armory on June 15-16, the last days of the Rose Festival. One hundred prizes will be offered. A silver cup will be awarded to the school winning the first prize, and if won for three years in succession it will become the permanent property of the school. The contestants are to be divided into two classes, those over and those under 13 years of age.

At Mosier a joint meeting of the local Horticultural Society, the school officials and the Commercial Club was held on Friday evening, at which time plans for developing the Country Life idea were perfected.

At Prairie City a plan is under way to interest the county schools of the city in the movement.

Wm. Thurston returned Sunday evening from a three months' visit with friends in Nebraska and Montana. He was accompanied by Mr. George Reeder, of Columbus, Nebraska, who will spend some time here. While in the Middle West, Mr. Thurston inspected many orchards, interviewed the horticulturists in that section and investigated the methods of raising and shipping fruit. He states that the main varieties of apples grown there are the Jonathans, Winesaps,
