Regarding the competition in the school children's Industrial Fair, to be held at The Dalles October 1-4, Superintendent J. T. Neff writes to the teachers of Wasco county: "It is desired that all the school children of Wasco county shall enter the competition for prizes. Teachers and parents are therefore urged to have the boys and girls begin at once the work of preparation. Explain the plan to them, interest them in the work, and give them the advice and encouragement necessary to insure their taking it up intelligently and systematically and with the enthusiasm essential to success. Plots of ground should be secured and set apart for gardening. The ground may be plowed for the children. Boys should begin working with tools, and girls should begin sewing and cooking. This work may be done either at home or at school. Those wishing to enter the poultry contest should secure settings of eggs from breeders of pure strains of chickens or ducks."

The Oleo People.
It looks as if the butter trust had overstepped its reasonable limit recently when it made its list raises in the market quotations. The maker of oleomargarine promptly saw their opportunity and advanced arguments, based largely on the price, why "oleo" should be used instead of butter. In consequence there was a large increase in the sale

of the butter substitute. Probably this was due to the demand by hotel and boarding house keepers. The public at large is not yet so accustomed to the use of artificial or imitation butter as to buy it knowingly, although it may be quite wholesome. Many persons would probably be surprised to learn that they have been eating oleomargarine, or "butterine," for years believing all the time that they were eating "creamery butter."
