WEST TO CONFER WITH LOCAL COURT.

According to a dispatch from Salem, Governor West intends to confer this week with the local county court in relation to the matter of building the road along the Columbia river between Hood River and Multnomah counties.

Appearing in behalf of S. Benson, E. E. Covert of Portland conferred with the Governor or the last of the week and offered to present him with a check for \$10,000, provided the governor would have it used in the construction of this particular road.

County Judge Culbertson has already suggested to the governor that the \$10,000 be turned over to the local Commercial Club and that a competent road supervisor be appointed to see that it is judiciously expended upon the road.
