REGISTER!

We wish to impress on the voters the importance of registering before the primary election. Of course it should not be necessary for any voter to be reminded of his duty and urged to perform it, but many people are careless or indifferent and if not urged, are apt to forget all about registering until it is too late to vote at the primary election without being sworn in, and then they think it is too much trouble. Every loyal citizen should regard the exercise of the franchise a privilege as well as a duty, and if a man willfully refuses to register and vote it would serve him right to be disfranchised, for what good does the ballot do him or his country?

Many questions are coming up this Fall for the consideration of the voter; and they should be studied carefully if intelligent action is to be taken. Also, many candidates are in the field for political honors. The average voter likes to feel that he has, by his ballot, been instrumental in helping to elect, or reject, as the case may be, certain candidates. But unless he registers and then goes to the primary election and casts his ballot for his particular candidate, he cheats himself of the privilege of expressing his choice, and possibly cheats his choice of some office. It works both ways.

Therefore, besure and Register and, what is of greater importance, get out and Vote at the primary election. We here in Mosier, believe we are entitled to recognition at the county seat. We have a good man up for the office of county commissioner and he is going to need every vote that can be polled for him, but Mosier must do her part to expect outside help. Show your loyalty to your community and your home candidate by piling up a handsome vote for him at the primary election.
