BEN SELLING

"I consider Ben Selling one of the straightest men I ever knew in all my life," remarked K. C. Couch, mayor of St Johns, in discussing the senatorial situation. "I served with him in the legislature, and I know a few things about his ideas of public life that should be known to every voter in Oregon. For instance, on one occasion the Portland Light and Power Company was about to place a large order for uniforms for street car employees. The company sent a representative to Ben Selling to see about the contract, and Mr. Selling refused to consider it because he was a member of the Oregon legislature. Another time I call to mind when the police department of Portland had a large order for uniforms. Selling again refused to consider it, telling the party that carried the message that, as long as he was a member of the legislature, he would not think of taking the business. But the case which appealed to me most of all was one time when Governor Benson, deceased, personally went to Selling and stated there were 300 suits of clothes needed for a state institution; that it was an emergency order, and there was no time to advertise, and the Governor wanted Selling to furnish the clothes. I know positively that Selling had in stock exactly what Benson asked for, sizes, quality, etc., yet Selling said, 'No, Governor, I can not conscientiously make such deals to sell the state goods while I am a member of the Oregon legislative body. I have the goods you want, and should be pleased to market them, but I don't think it would be the right thing to do, and I will not consider it.'

"I would like to ask," continued Mayor Couch, "if a man such as I know Ben Selling to be is not thoroughly entitled to the confidence of the Oregon people? I think he is."

What a fine opportunity a country editor has for proving himself a good fellow by publishing "gratis" all kind of "dope," oftentimes an advertisement in disguise, of some wonderful discovery, or exploiting the merits of some measure that will benefit "the dear people" - stuff that will "fill up" his columns and which he should be deluged to get. Recently we received several columns of "boiler plate" regarding a certain presidential candidate, with which we are expected to "fill in" our empty space. Every thing political entering this sheet is grist and paid for accordingly. Likewise every thing else from which it is expected to reap benefit. We are not particularly philanthropic and can't afford to give away space, which is our stock in trade, any more than the butcher, the baker, the merchant, or any other business man.

BACK YOUR FAVORITE.

There is every reason why every republican voter should turn out on primary election day and cast his ballot, especially for Commissioner. We in this part of the county feel that we are entitled to recognition at the county seat. We have put up a good man for the office of county commissioner in C. J. Littlepage, a man of good judgment, sound principles and a desire to give every section of the county a square deal. Now the only thing to do is to stand by him and vote, to a man, for your own candidate. Of course we know that our efforts alone will not nominate our candidate.

We also know that the gift of any office lies practically in the hands of The Dalles voters. It is therefore up to The Dalles to give us what we are reasonably entitled to have - representation at the county seat. But if we

do not prove our willingness to help ourselves by earnest and individual efforts, we cannot complain if others show a lack of interest. We are not comparing the relative merits of the candidates for this office. It would simply be a toss-up as to each one's ability and standing in his respective district. Both are good men. It is not a question of men, but of locality. Southern and Eastern Wasco have been represented by commissioners for several years, but not since Hood River county was set apart has Mosier district had a look-in and she feels that she is now entitled to it.
