Relaxation of the Mind and Muscles is the Principal Thing to Keep in Mind.

How to get to sleep, when every device fails and one feels desperate, is a matter worth solving, especially if there be simple methods that can be tried.

A well-known lecturer on hygiene, whom a very sleepless woman consulted on the subject of bad nights, gave her valuable advice, the efficacy of which she has proved.

"Stretch out your limbs to the full length, with the arms rather close to the sides of the body, and straight down," said he, "or if that is not comfortable, in any downward fashion."

"Sometimes you may find it for the moment restful to clasp the arms above the head, but on no account give way to the habit of doing so, for this position drives away the blood from the heart and sends it to the head, causing uneasy dreams, and therefore restlessness, and may even prevent sleep altogether."

"Gently close your mouth and breathe through your nose. This is highly important. Then let all the muscles of the face and neck be relaxed, and all muscles of the body, too."

Women of mature age should be as careful as girls to see that they sleep with the mouth shut, for this habit combats a tendency, growing with the years, to drop or protrude the jaw as the face is relaxed to sleep. A closed mouth and relaxed muscles help to keep your young looking.

Above all, sleep on your right side. Wonderful for inducing sleep is a cup of hot milk sipped slowly in bed the very last thing.

DRAWNS LINE AT INKY STAMPS

TURKEY WOULD GOBBLE PERSIA

Moves Troops Into Province Claimed By Russia.

Porte Believed to Have Backing of Stronger Power, and German Designs Are Suspected.

London.—The relations of Russia and Turkey, which a few weeks ago caused the circulation of alarming reports, may at any moment reach an acute stage, and again the bone of contention will be Persia.

At the close of the Russo-Japanese war, Turkey moved troops into the Persian province of Azerbaijan, a strip of which has been in dispute for upwards of 200 years. Turkey claims this strip; Persia holds it, but the ownership has yet to be decided.

The question has been a subject of negotiations, but while these have been going on Russia asserts that Turkey has been advancing her forces slowly until they have gone even beyond the disputed strip and now command the western part of Azerbaijan from Lake Urumiah to the frontier, and can easily attack the Russian province of Erivan.

Turkey denies any aggressive intentions. She has informed the Russian minister to the porte that she has troops in the disputed territory only as a temporary expedient, waiting the outcome of friendly negotiations, and if necessary a reference to The Hague tribunal.

Turkey's firmness in supporting her contention, and in not only placing troops in the disputed strip but moving them forward, has given rise in Russia to a suspicion that some other power is behind the Ottoman government.

It is pointed out that the acquisition of territory on the Persian frontier might be accepted as compensation for Turkey for the loss of Tripoli and the power that could bring about this exchange would please Italy.

Germany, which before has tried to secure concessions on Lake Urumiah, is the power suspected.

AWARD FARMS BY LOTTERY.
Only Settlers May File and Speculators Are Shut Out.

Washington, D. C.—Details of the proposed government lottery, by which valuable farms in the Tieton irrigation project in Washington will be disposed of to settlers, are given in an announcement made by the Reclamation service. The announcement says:

"The third unit of the Tieton irrigation project, Washington, will be opened by a unique form of drawing. This unit contains about 40 farms upon which homestead entry may be made. They are among the finest fruit lands in the United States and extremely valuable. Irrigation lands under other portions of this project are selling for \$50 to \$1,200 an acre, exclusive of the water right."

"During December an eager line of land seekers anticipating approaching opening, took up their position just outside the land office in North Yakima and refused to leave, even upon warning of the government officials that they would acquire no special privileges by remaining."

"In order that all land seekers may have an equal opportunity to obtain farms, it has been decided to allow each homesteeder to signify which farm unit he desires. Names of all who wish to file on unit A will then be placed in a box from which a disinterested party will draw one slip."

"The winner of the government lottery will then be allowed to make his filing and the next farm unit will be taken up, etc."

The lottery plan of opening the Tieton lands was decided upon after it became known that a considerable number of persons who have been in line at the office are representing speculators. The purpose of the department is to throw this land, as far as possible, open to settlers who will make it their homes.

Race Riots Are Feared.
Fayetteville, W. Va.—Extra deputies and police were sworn in by the authorities in the mining communities of Boomer, Cannelton and Marling, because of imminence of race riots between Americans and Italian miners. Bitterness is caused primarily by the murder of Washington Bostwick, a bank boss, who was shot by three Italians a few days ago. Governor Glasscock has been asked to have militia in readiness to be sent here at a moment's notice. At Boomer every miner is armed with a rifle.

Tongueless Man Talks.
Cincinnati.—Joseph Monague, 48 years old, had the alternative of foregoing his life or having his tongue extirpated several days ago because of cancer on that organ. He chose the latter course and today surprised the nurses and internes at the city hospital by gaining the powers of speech after the doctors had told him he would be bereft of his voice. Physicians now explain that the vocal chords are still intact, and by concentrating all his energy in the effort Monague is able to articulate.

Mexican Situation Grave.
Washington, D. C.—Senator Culom, of Illinois, sent a dispatch to friends in his state, saying it would be impossible for him to attend the primaries in his home city, as the gravity of the Mexican situation made it necessary for him, as chairman of the senate foreign relations committee, to remain in Washington. He declared optimistically that his presence in Illinois was not needed, as he felt assured of his renomination.

Paravel Balloon Sold.
Berlin.—A report is published here that the Paravel dirigible balloon, which has just been completed, has been sold to the Japanese government.

FAVORS THREE-YEAR BILL.
Clark Makes Good His Promise to Western Senator.

Washington, D. C.—Making good his promise to Senator Borah, of Idaho, Champ Clark left the speaker's chair last Wednesday, took the floor, and in a 10-minute speech strongly urged the passage of the Borah-Jones three-year homestead bill.

"I am in favor of fixing it so that no American citizen will want to depart from the United States to secure a home in a foreign land," said the speaker in conclusion, amid a storm of applause from both sides of the house.

After declaring his purpose hereafter to participate somewhat in the debates in the house, Speaker Clark said: "Missourians take an abiding interest in the whole Western country."

He then recited the fact that Thomas H. Benton, "the greatest Missouri statesman that ever lived," had conceived the idea of passing a homestead law, but passed out of congress before he could carry out his idea. The day that Benton left the senate, Galusha A. Grow, of Pennsylvania, entered the house, and after six successive sessions, finally passed a bill which embodied the Benton idea of what a homestead law should be.

Clark contended therefore that the homestead law was really a Missouri product.

The speaker also called attention to the fact that great numbers of Missourians have left their native state and moved farther West. "That Western country has been largely populated by Missourians," said the speaker. "They are a prolific race. I suppose I have received 100 letters from Missourians in the West in favor of this bill, and I am making these remarks to please them more than for any other reason, except for the strongest reason possible, and that is that the bill is right and ought to pass."

BILL AIMED AT COMBINE.
Foreign Ship Trust Would Feel Weight of New Law.

Washington, D. C.—A bill designed to break up foreign shipping pools and combinations and to give to this government greater control over such alleged restraints of trade which originate outside the United States, was introduced by Representative Humphrey, of Washington. The government now has several anti-trust suits pending against foreign steamship combinations.

The bill would provide that any vessel not of the United States owned or controlled by any person or corporation adjudged to have violated the Sherman law, and which might be used to carry out the purposes adjudged unlawful, be prohibited from entering any port of the United States or clearing therefrom under penalty of \$25,000 for each offense.

The bill also would provide that the postmaster general cancel the mail carrying contract of any vessel owned or controlled by persons adjudged violators of the law.

The bill was referred to the committee on merchant marine which is preparing to investigate the alleged shipping combine.

BUGABOO TO PERISH.
Taft's Reply to Lodge Resolution to Still War Talk.

Washington, D. C.—President Taft's answer to the Lodge resolution calling for information as to the reported establishment by Japan of a naval base at Magdalena Bay in Mexico will be designed to set at rest the constant rumors of Japanese colonization in North America and will be a distinct blow at the bugaboo of war with Japan.

Although it was denied that Senator Lodge was acting in sympathy with the administration, it was admitted that the president would make use of his resolution to set at rest reports of friction with friendly powers.

Chairman Sulzer, of the house foreign affairs committee, after a talk with President Taft, declared the Lodge resolution "the merest buncombe" and that Japan had acquired no rights for a naval station from Mexico.

Federal Recall Is Urged.
Washington, D. C.—The recall of Federal judges by popular vote at presidential elections was proposed by Representative Taylor, Democrat, of the Federal judge of any district, under the proposed bill, could be removed from office "on account of lack of good behavior." There would be no specifications as to the bad behavior of a judge, but merely a denial of good behavior. The voters, at the same time, could recommend to the president their choice of a successor for the judge sought to be removed.

Fisher Thought Hostile.
Washington, D. C.—The conference committee on the three-year homestead bill is working on its report. There is every indication that the committee will agree upon a good bill, but evidence accumulates that Secretary Fisher is growing more and more hostile and will insist on the insertion in the bill of provisions not approved by either house. This cannot be done under the rules of congress and there is some uneasiness for fear Fisher will recommend that the bill be vetoed, as he did with the burned timber bill.

Munitions Go to Madero.
Washington, D. C.—President Taft has authorized the exportation from the United States of five big shipments of munitions of war consigned to the forces of President Madero. These included two machine guns, other arms and ammunition, horses and blankets. The president also gave permission for the exportation of a quantity of dynamite for the use of a mining company in the Mexican state of Sonora.

Maryland Primary Bill Signed.
Annapolis, Md.—Governor Goldsborough signed the Harper presidential primary election bill. The bill provides for a primary election to be held May 6.
