OCEAN LINER AT BOTTOM OF SEA.

1300 PASSENGERS REPORTED LOST.

MOSTLY WOMEN RESCUED.

The most appalling marine disaster ever known occurred last Sunday night when the mammoth White Star liner Titanic collided with an iceberg off the Newfoundland Banks.

The Titanic, the largest and finest steamship on the seas, was supposed to have been invulnerable to disaster of any kind. Now she lies two miles under water, many of the wealthiest and most notable magnates in the financial world going down with her.

It is stated that the combined wealth of the passengers would aggregate \$1,000,000,000. The boat itself cost millions of dollars.

The survivors of the ill fated vessel suffered much hardships from exposure.

CONSOLIDATED NORTHWEST FRUIT SELLING AGENCY.

Consolidation of the two movements to establish a general Northwest fruit selling agency at Portland has been effected. The Northwest Fruit Exchange has changed its by-laws to provide for ultimate mutualization under control of the growers' unions which ship through the exchange. A committee representing the Portland Commercial Club, Chamber of Commerce and Clearing House Association has investigated the subject and recommends co-operation with the exchange on the part of the press, commercial organizations, banks and the fruit growers. The Portland bankers are arranging to finance advances to growers, based on the market value of the crop as fixed by the exchange.

Until two years ago the demand for Oregon and Washington apples was so heavy that buyers eagerly purchased crops on the trees. The increase in acreage is so enormous, however, that without a strong cooperative selling agency the entire prosperity of the fruit industry would be in danger. Last year, hundreds of carloads of apples, shipped by individuals and local associations, were sacrificed at auction in Eastern markets for little more than freight charges.

The prices secured for those districts marketing through the Northwestern Fruit Exchange were high and the growers received large and prompt returns. Co-operation with the exchange, as reorganized, has been assured by the different commercial bodies and a vigorous campaign will be conducted to secure a heavy tonnage. The fruit districts represented at the Portland meeting were Rogue River, Mosier, Walla Walla, Yakima, Wenatchee, Cashmere, Spokane, Lewiston and Boise. A branch office of the exchange will be established at Spokane, but the operating headquarters will be built up at Portland.

Uniting these two movements means the salvation of the fruit industry by building up one strong selling agency.

HOOD RIVER'S APPLE BLOSSOM FESTIVAL BIGGEST EVENT IN ITS HISTORY.

The Hood River Commercial Club, with the enthusiastic support of all the valley citizens, plans on making the initial Apple Blossom Festival, which will be held from May 2-5 inclusive, the greatest event of the kind the valley has ever

known. With the co-operation of the O. W. R. & N. Co., which has made a one-and-one third fare the round trip for the occasion, and the Columbia boat companies, the community will be crowded with guests for the four days.

The Portland Commercial club, which will spend Friday in the Dalles on a junketing trip, will reach the Valley Saturday and will be taken on a tour over the blossom area. At a smoker to be given them on Saturday night, S. Benson, the donor of the \$10,000 for the construction of the Columbia River road around Shell Rock mountain, will be the guest of honor.

On Sunday, May 5, the members of the Portland Press club and editors of neighboring cities with their wives and ladies will be entertained at a picnic at Eggermont, the home of Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Hall.

RESETTING TREES.

Uniformly poor results have followed the replacing of trees that died immediately by other trees of the same kind. But if the hole is opened up in the fall and allowed to lie until in the spring it is safe to then plant out a tree of same kind as that which died. The hole should be opened out a good deal wider and deeper than necessary to receive the new tree. The purpose should be to get out a large part of the dirt around the root system of the first tree that occupied the land.—Ex.

TRIBUTE TO SELLING PAID BY JOURNAL

Portland Newspaper Says He is a Friend of the People.

Stood for Statement No. One When Many Republicans Refused to do so.

Proving that a long career of consistent fighting for measures that bring the state government closer to the people, and also sends the name of Oregon to the top of the column in advanced legislation, the following extract from the Portland Daily Journal of Friday, February 22, 1912, not only endorses the progressive policies of Ben Selling which are now laws on the statute books of Oregon, but it also shows beyond question the standing of this man among the people and press of the state:

MR. SELLING

Senator Ben Selling has announced his intention to contest for the Republican nomination for United States senator. For a number of years the political course of Mr. Selling and The Journal have run along much the same lines. Support of progressive methods of government in Oregon when they were badly in need of support, brought Mr. Selling and The Journal on common ground.

When there was need of Statement One candidates for the legislature, they were not always easy to find. There was a time when most of the higher-ups of the Republican party in Oregon were, and some of them still are, against Statement One. It was in such a time that Mr. Selling was a welcome addition to the forces that were striving for direct election of senator, and for elimination of disgraceful deadlocks at Salem.

GERMANS ARE FOR SELLING

Prominent German Paper Voices Its Sentiment.

When Robert Mantell, the actor, was in Portland, two weeks ago, he presented the play "Julius Caesar." In the very opening scene two senators give an illustration of their ideas of their office. They meet a crowd of workmen on the street, and command them to get back to their trades, and exchange their holiday garments for the leather aprons of their crafts. A senator those days didn't think much of the people.

A Roman senator didn't have to live in the district that paid him. He was not required to know the people who supported him. He scorned his constituency, and knew no more of them than that they promptly and plentifully furnished him with money. He spent the money for his own aggrandizement, and never gave an accounting. That would have been belittling to the dignity of a senator.

Here in America we don't approve of a senator who ignores the people. Oregon doesn't endorse a senator who

has the Roman idea of his office, and the aristocrat's estimate of the people.

For the past six years Oregon has been paying the salary of a Caius Carius style of senator at Washington; a senator who ignores the people who support him, and avoids the contamination of residence among them.

The people of Oregon want a senator who knows the people, and who believes in them; who is interested in them, and proves his position by making himself one of them. Oregon wants a senator who recognizes manhood even in working clothes; who doesn't demand that his fellow citizens put on evening dress before they will be permitted to shake hands with him; who concedes the just demands of labor, and would put the lightest burden on the shoulders least able to carry it.

Oregon men and women want Ben Selling to be their senator at Washington. They have tried the Roman aristocrat, non-resident type, and they don't like it. The manhood of the state is for Selling.—The Zeitung.

Will Win in a Walk.

It is beginning to look like an easy ride for Ben Selling to the United States Senate. Formerly there was no telling what the legislature would do, but now it is a pretty certain thing that it will follow the wishes of the people.—Redmond Hub.
