Nature has done her part in this, but man is leaving undone a very important part in not placing a fish ladder at the Mosier falls, so that the trout may ascend the creek from the river and return at will. Years ago the fishing in Mosier creek was ample for the residents and a few outsiders, but since we have grown and so many non-residents come in and whip our streams, it is up to the enterprising citizens and especially the lovers of the sport of angling, to prevail upon the State Fish Warden to place ladders at the two falls, or do it themselves if they would keep the stream properly stocked. We have no rainbow trout in the creek above the falls, but they are caught below. A fish ladder would stock the creek to its head waters with a great variety of fish.

**A Novel Idea**

Not only does Mrs. A. M. Roop furnish her patrons with as good dairy butter as can be made, but she has provided a means of delivering it in first-class condition in the "melting" weather of mid-summer. She is having made by J. P. Erhart, Mosier's carpenter, an ice box which will fit snugly into the back of the hack. In the bottom of the box is a galvanized iron receptacle for ice, with a rack resting on top of it, on which the butter, milk, vegetables, etc., may be placed, and be kept cool indefinitely.

**Railroad Grants the Right of Way**

The last obstacle in the building of the Portland-Hood river road around Shell rock was removed this week when the O. W. R. & N. Company accepted the right-of-way surveyed by County Surveyor Murray Kay. Only one change was asked by Chief Engineer Boschke of the railroad and the county court is prepared to acquiesce in making

this change.

County Judge Culbertson, Mr. Kay and W. L. Clarke returned the last of the week from Portland, where they attended a conference with the railroad officials. The only point at which the route of the road must be changed is at the sliding rock just east of Shell Rock. Here the railroad insists that the county's road must be constructed above the retaining walls, which were constructed at large expense to hold back the masses of loose rock. This change will entail an additional expense on the county of about \$2000.

The matter has been referred to Superintendent O'Brien of the O. W. R. & N. for final approval. It is expected that this will be received this week, when the main body of convicts will at once be brought to Shell Rock and work started.—Hood River News.

Extensive displays of state products will undoubtedly be arranged at Portland during the Rose Festival, Elks Convention and other gatherings of the coming Summer. The thousands of visitors to the Rose City during the year will thus be able to get a comprehensive knowledge of Oregon's resources and the advertising will be of great value to the state.

**Local Telephone Company to Extend Line**

It is reported that the Mosier Valley Telephone Company will soon extend its service to accommodate the ranchers on Rock Creek, "Ireland Ridge," and intermediate points. The work of getting out the poles was begun this week and the line will be finished as soon as possible.

This extension will be about an eight party line; that is to say, there will be eight phones installed, but it will serve a large territory and bring it within close touch with the outside world. There is an old saying that one "might as well be out of the world as out of fashion." This is very true as regards the telephone, and the people in the district to be served evidently realize the importance and convenience of this great time saver and space eliminator. There are yet two or three neighborhoods in the Mosier district that are not connected by phone, but they will eventually get into line. Then will come the rural mail delivery system, another time saver for the farmer.
