Migratory Birds.
In a recent issue of the National Geographic Magazine Mr. Wells Cook of the United States biological survey, has presented an interesting study of bird migration. In his article he tells us that the cliff swallows which nest in Nova Scotia leave the Gulf coast of Mexico about March 10 and arrive at their destination two months later, on May 10. Most of the birds that spend the winter in Central or South America, he says, take the direct route across the gulf instead of going via Texas or by way of Florida, Cuba or Yucatan, and this aerial journey means a single flight of from 600 to 700 miles with no alighting place. But the greatest traveler of all is the golden plover, which nests in summer on the arctic shores of North America, whence it migrates to Labrador, and at Nova Scotia begins a 2,500 mile flight to South America. Its winter home is in Argentina, and after a six-month stay there it comes back across the gulf and up the Mississippi valley, and when it is again at its summer home it has covered about 15,000 miles. The arctic terns accomplish in 20 weeks a round trip of 22,000 miles between the arctic and antarctic oceans.

Gum From Seaweed.

SUFFRAGISTS IN GIANT PARADE

15,000 Women March Through Streets of New York.
Baby Carriages Are Prominent Feature—Men Disappointed When Roosevelt Refuses to Lead.

New York—The weather man provided a warm sun and a cloudless sky for the biggest woman's suffrage demonstration in the history of New York City.

For nearly a year preparations for the great suffrage parade have been under way, and there was little for Mrs. Harriet Stanton Blatch and her assistants to do except to marshal the various divisions of their force. The 15,000 women—and men, too, who had asked for places in the parade—received a last word of exhortation from Mrs. Blatch during the morning.

"Remember," she said through a printed card with which each parade was provided, "you march for the mightiest reform the world has ever seen. The orderly appearance of our procession depends upon each individual marcher. Remember the public will judge, quite illogically, of course, but not less strictly, your qualifications as a voter by your promptness."

BILLION HENS AT WORK.
New York City Consumes 1,400,000,000 Eggs in One Year.
New York—Some startling figures as to the appetite of this city have been gathered by the marketing committee of the State Food investigating commission here. It appears that each year, New York consumes between 1,296,000,000 and 1,400,000,000 eggs, and that before now there have been put away in cold storage warehouses of this city no fewer than 319,800,000 eggs.
Each week the inhabitants of this city eat more than 1,350,000 pounds of butter and in course of the year manage to make away with 72,000,000 pounds.
Last year the market for cheese was considered unusually poor, but in spite of that fact the amount consumed in the city was 30,000,000 pounds.

MORE LIFEBOATS FOR LINERS

Double Bottoms and Automatic Rafts Also Are Proposed.
Washington, D. C.—More lifeboats on trans-Atlantic liners, an equipment of rafts that automatically will float clear of a sinking vessel and the construction of great passenger steamers with double hulls and extended watertight compartments—all these reforms are indicated before the senate committee investigating the Titanic disaster, will exist in the immediate future.

J. Bruce Ismay, president and managing director of the International Mercantile Marine company, told the committee that in his opinion, the reform to be done. He promised to take the question up with the constructors of the big liners as soon as he returned to England.

The head of the most powerful shipping combination in the world shared interest in the hearing with E. J. Dunn, a New York importer. Mr. Dunn proved a recalcitrant witness. After telling of information he had received that the White Star Line officials had received positive information of the Titanic disaster 12 hours before they gave it out, he refused to give the name of his informant.

Senator Smith insisted on knowing the name of the persons responsible for the statement. Dunn said he received it in confidence and had pledged himself not to divulge the name. Summarily dismissed from the stand in the charge of an assistant sergeant-at-arms, the witness spent most of the morning on the long-distance telephone endeavoring to be absolved from his pledge.

NEW RECORDS MADE.
Speed-Fiends Drive Autos Without Mishap.
Santa Monica, Cal.—One hundred and seventy-five thousand persons saw the new world's records established at the fourth annual Santa Monica automobile races here. Teddy Tetzlaff, of Los Angeles, driving a 90-horsepower Fiat, won the 303-mile free-for-all with the phenomenal record of 73.50 miles an hour, breaking the previous mark of 74.63, made last year by Harvey Herrick in a National on the same course.
In the medium-car event, Ralph De Palma, the Italian driver, in a Mercer, set a new record of 69.54 miles an hour for 151 miles, and in the light-car event George Joermann, of Los Angeles, driving a Maxwell, placed the 101-mile record for small cars at 61.86 miles an hour.

EASY TO KEEP A LOG BOOK

Apparently as Complicated as Double-Entry Bookkeeping, But Little Study Solves Problem.
How many landmen know how a log book is written up? It seems just as complicated as double entry bookkeeping when one does not know, but study it's as easy to keep a log book as to eat hot gingerbread. There is a list of letters arranged and they look like so much Greek to the uneducated.

The letter h, for instance, stands for blue sky, whether there be clear or hazy atmosphere; c indicates cloudy or detached opening clouds, d denotes drizzling rain, a small f, a capital F thick fog, g gloomy, dark weather; h hail, l lightning and m misty or hazy so as to interfere with the view.

The letter o represents overcast, or when the whole sky is covered with one impenetrable cloud. Passing showers are noted by the letter p, and q indicates the weather to be equally continuous rain is indicated by an r, snow by an s, and thunder by a t.

An ugly, threatening appearance in the weather calls for the letter u, and visibility of distant objects, whether the sky be cloudy or not, is represented by the letter v. A small w is wet dew. A full point or dot under any letter denotes an extraordinary degree.

DO TRICKS WITH AEROPLANE
Two Swedish Acrobats Include Somersaulting Machine in Their Stage Equipment—How Worked.
In order to give a modern touch to acrobatic tricks of a kind that have been familiar to theater-goers for years, two Swedish acrobats include a somersaulting aeroplane in their stage equipment, says the Popular Mechanics. At one end of a girder pivoted to a standard about 12 feet high, is a miniature aeroplane so constructed as to be able to turn somersaults. The 3-foot propeller of the machine, driven by a five-horsepower two-cylinder engine, sends the aeroplane around on the end of the girder, the other end of which is provided with a counterpoise. The acrobat works the elevating plane with his feet and operates the rudder with his right hand, making the machine turn somersaults.

The banks of this city have forwarded \$1,900,000 to San Francisco banks for safety.
