Important to Fruit Growers

The present indications are that apple trees will be very heavily loaded this year, and considerable thinning will be required.

Heretofore, in thinning, it has been the general custom to clip a cluster of apples from around the center apple, cutting the stems closer to the fruit than the limb. This leaves a number of long stems in close proximity to the remaining apple, one or more of which will in almost every instance, puncture the skin of the apple, giving lodgement for insects, or at least making it unfit for fancy pack. In doing this thinning it is very important that the apples removed should be clipped off close to the limb. By doing this it will protect the fruit left on the tree from injury.
