TAXPAYER OBJECTS

EDITOR MOSIER BULLETIN:

Will you kindly allow a taxpayer space in your columns to state a few plain facts and to place himself on record as objecting strenuously to the action of the County Court of Wasco in forcing the people to pay for the building of a new court house, simply to gratify the avowed ambition of a retiring county officer who wishes to leave to the county a monument to his administration.

We claim, with many others, that the people of the county have not been given a square deal; that they have had no voice in the matter; that, by the secret action of the county court they have been saddled with a burden that they are not willing or ready to carry, especially when they are told in a "public-damned" manner that the court house would be built if 90 per cent of the taxpayers should object. It is not so much a question with the county court, as to the real need of a new building as it is a determination to have it. It is not so much a question with the people as to the expediency of a new building. It is the fact that they are being forced into it, and the method the county court employed in gaining their object. If there is one thing that the American people object to it is being coerced.

It is a fact that, when asked if a new court house would be built, County Judge Lake replied: "There's nothing doing," when he knew that negotiations were then pending for a contract and that he was a party to them. Now this, Mr. Editor, is the situation as it stands, and the Taxpayers League of Wasco County is taking steps to change the complexion of affairs by issuing an injunction against the County Court, and also to invoke the recall on the court, individually and collectively, for the following reasons:

First: That they do not enforce the plain provisions of the law.

Second: Their acts as public officials have been so arranged that the letting of important contracts for public works was not properly advertised, resulting:

(A) In stifling competition and thus preventing local and other citizens from bidding on contracts for the said public works.

(B) Preventing competition in bidding on contracts for public work, thus resulting in inferior work being done for the County, and increased cost of same to the taxpayers and citizens of Wasco County.

Third: Their acts as public officials have been extravagant and unbusinesslike and carelessly done, making them unfit to transact the public business of the citizens of Wasco County.

On the strength of these and other reasons, the Taxpayers League of Wasco County has circulated petitions for the signature of the taxpayers of the county, asking for the recall of the members of the County Court.

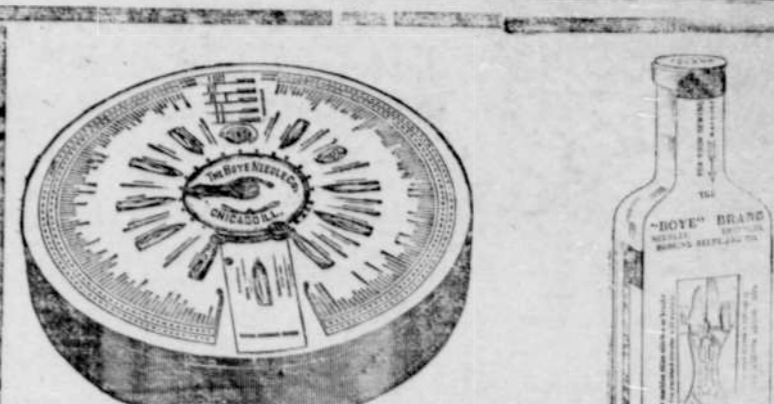

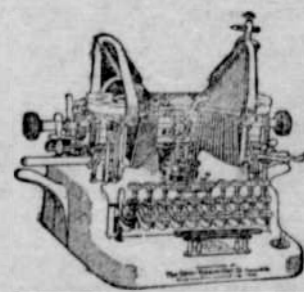

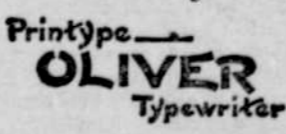
