Northwest Prosperity

The crops in Washington, Idaho and Oregon this year will exceed by far any previous amount, says Better Fruit. According to a recent issue of the Oregonian, the following crops will be produced, and which in volume will be worth \$142,715,000: Wheat, oats, barley, hay, fruit, wool and hops. All promise splendid yields. The Northwest is particularly fortunate in having its chief industry composed of food products, which the public are obliged to have even the business in general may still continue to be affected during the balance of the year by the presidential contest and other causes. Nevertheless the Northwest will have a splendid season of prosperity because the people must eat to live and the Northwest has the food products with which to supply them. The soil and climatic conditions in the Northwest are all extremely favorable for producing the above products, and not only a high class quality but a splendid quantity to the acre, which means prosperity to the farmers, and if the farmers are prosperous then the Northwest country in general will be prosperous.

Portland will have a big apple show next Winter. The time has been fixed tentatively as the last week in November. Business men of the Rose City are now working on the details. Good prizes will be offered and it is expected to make the affair a big success. It will be under the general direction of the State Horticultural Society and business interests and commercial bodies will co-operate fully.

For the first time in its history the famous battleship Oregon is to visit its own state. During the Elks reunion, in July, the historic old fighting ship will be brought to Portland harbor, where it will be much admired by all loyal Oregonians. Naval officials have at last given their consent to the request that the Oregon be brought here.

Oregon has a good chance to win the national prize for advance in earth education this year. The state committee has under way an exhibit showing how 75,000 boys and girls of the state have been interested in the new competitive gardening contests and how 10,000 Portland school children were enlisted in similar work in this city alone. Perhaps no other state ever gave such liberal support to this movement at the outset. The next step, it is expected, will be to make this industrial education an integral part of the state school system.

There is a man in Hood River district who some time ago set out seven crabapple trees in his orchard. His neighbors ridiculed him for giving the trees room on such valuable land. When the trees came into bearing this man invited these same neighbors over to get some of the fruit. The apples were good and the neighbors heaped themselves. They acquired the habit of helping themselves to this fruit, which they wouldn't raise themselves. Last season they were invited over as usual, but for some reason failed to show up. Not wanting the fruit wasted, the owner shipped a bushel basket of the apples to a commission house in Portland, as an experiment. The house wrote him immediately that they would take all he had, and quoted a price. The man shipped the entire crop from the seven trees to Portland and received a check for \$245, or \$35 per tree. It is a safe bet that this man's neighbors will receive no invitation this year to "come over and help yourselves."

Franklin P. Mays has been pardoned by President Taft. Mays was convicted in 1906 for conspiring to defraud the government of a large amount of land in the Blue Mountains, and was sentenced to four months in prison and to pay a fine of \$10,000. On account of illness the sentence was never enforced. Mr. Mays, whose health was broken by the terrible nervous strain incident to the trial and the disgrace of conviction, was greatly relieved when news of his pardon reached him.

Married in Vancouver.

Mr. N. Parke Sturgess and Miss Josie Staley were married on Thursday, June 20th, at the bride's home in Vancouver. The happy couple arrived in Mosier last Saturday and are living on the Ed Reeves place, near town, where Mr. Sturgess will work this summer. Felicitations are in order.

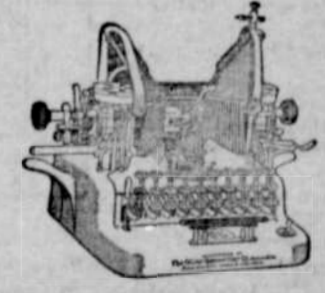
