HOTEL WILL OPEN SOON

The old Pines Hotel, which has been closed for some time while repairs were being made, will be opened to the public about July 15th, under entirely new management, and will be known as the Hotel Mosier.

Dr. H. J. Patterson, of Lebanon, Ore., who has leased the building for a term of years, is a practical hotel man of long experience in catering to the public—especially the discriminating public, and knows just what the public wants and how to provide it. The doctor is widely known in the state as a popular and successful landlord, and when the travelling men all up and down the line learn that Dr. Patterson has taken charge of the Mosier hotel, they will be sure to make Mosier an all-night stopping place, instead of passing it up as at present, and they will also recommend it to the general public.

The hotel is being thoroughly renovated and refurnished throughout. There will be hot and cold water in every room, two private bathrooms, electric lights, and the beds will be furnished with fine box mattresses. Dr. Patterson states that everything possible will be done for the comfort and convenience of his guests. He has secured one of the best cooks in the state; one who can serve a meal in any style for any nationality. And the table will always be furnished with the best the market affords. In fact, Dr. Patterson's intention is to make Hotel Mosier such a popular place that the residents of the town and country will take pleasure in going there for their Sunday and holiday dinners and they will not be ashamed to have their friends entertained there. There will be a piano in the parlor for the amusement of the guests.

The opening of the new Hotel Mosier will mark the beginning of more prosperous times for the town and country. It will stimulate business, affording a home market for fresh country produce of all kinds, and when it becomes generally known that we have a good family and commercial hotel, many people will come here to spend a few weeks or months during the summer and fall. This number will increase each year and of those who come, no doubt there will be some who will locate permanently. Dr. Patterson deserves much credit for taking hold of what appeared to be a hopeless proposition and he should have the hearty co-operation of the entire community.

The local lodge of Odd Fellows, who purchased the hotel building some time ago as a business venture, realizing that a good hotel is an absolute necessity to a town, are spending considerable money in putting the building in proper condition and are carrying out many of Dr. Patterson's suggestions as to remodeling and furnishing. The Odd Fellows deserve to realize well on their investment.

WILL BUILD WAREHOUSE

Ground was broken this week on the railroad right-of-way, west of Washington Street, for a public warehouse, which will be built and operated by H. M. West, who has had considerable experience in this line of business, having for years been connected with the Moody warehouse at Shaniko. It is Mr. West's intention to handle hay, grain and feed and do a general warehouse business, both public and private. This will be a great convenience to the public generally, who will be able to use the building for storage purposes, both for shipping their products out and their freight in. The building will be 56x64 feet in size and will stand close to the railroad house-track, where loading and unloading can be done easily.

Mr. West stated that if business justifies he will later build a frost-proof addition for the storage of fruit, potatoes and other perishable goods.

Mr. West is to be commended for inaugurating this public convenience and making it possible for those who buy their hay, grain and feed to engage it right at home, and to have the use of a general public warehouse. We trust that the business Mr. West receives will fully justify his expectations.

LUMBER BUSINESS GOOD

That the general trend of business is upward in the Mosier District, despite the prevailing impression that times are dull because this is a "presidential year," is evidenced in several ways, principally, perhaps, by the amount of lumber which the Tum-A-Lum Company has sold recently.

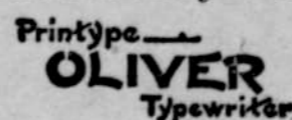

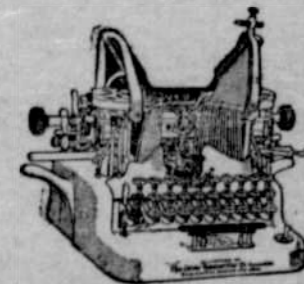
