PACIFIC HIGHWAY MOVEMENT

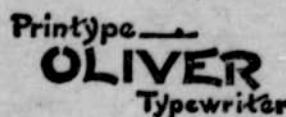

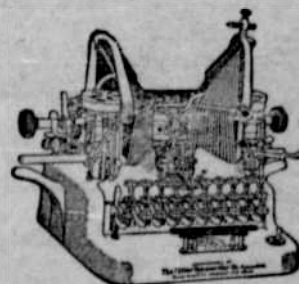
