## SHIELDS WILL EXPOSE SINGLE TAX TOMORROW NIGHT

Following a request from a number of prominent men that he come to Mosier to explain and elucidate Single Tax, Chas. H. Shields, Secretary of the Oregon Equal Taxation League, will be here tomorrow night and speak in Stroup's Hall at 8:30 o'clock. His subject will be "Single Tax Exposed."

Mr. Shields is the author of the pamphlet "Single Tax Exposed," which has been read by a large number of residents of this county, and he is at present conducting the campaign in Oregon against Single Tax which has received comment in some cases and commendation in others from all over the state.

It will be well worth while for those in favor of Single Tax and those who agree with Mr. Shields to be present at this meeting.

Following his address, Mr. Shields announces that he will be perfectly willing to answer any questions propounded to him.

It is expected that a number of local men will be on the platform with Mr. Shields and he will be introduced by R. M. Ross, Cashier of the Mosier Valley Bank. The meeting is being held under the auspices of the business men of Mosier.
