INTEREST IN BOAT LANDING LIVELY

A number of enthusiastic citizens met at the Bulletin office on Wednesday night and discussed plans for securing a boat landing. Figures were given showing that \$275 in money had been subscribed, and sufficient labor to do the grading, etc., providing the work could all be done at once.

Many of the citizens of the district have already subscribed money and labor, showing their interest in and desire that the project be put thru. These are a number of Doubting Thomases, however, who lack faith—not in the project itself, but in the ability of Mosier to put anything thru. Perhaps there is some foundation for this feeling, and perhaps, again, it is the indifference of these same D. T.'s to their own and their district's welfare that has heretofore made it so difficult to accomplish anything for the public good.

Mosier is the only town on the Columbia River without a boat landing. True, other towns may be more favorably located naturally, still a good one can be had here. It is practicable and a necessity. Why then, in the name of business and common sense should we not have one?

A ways and means committee was appointed at Wednesday night's meeting, consisting of E. A. Race, S. D. Fisher and H. G. Kibbee, who will make it their business to solicit subscriptions from those citizens in the district and those having interests here who have not already subscribed to the fund. No one is asked to put up a cent of cash until it is known that a sufficient amount has been subscribed to insure the completion of the project. When this is done the money will be collected and work will be at once begun.

Now, when any one of the committee approaches you with a subscription paper, don't try to make a "get-away," or claim that we never can get a boat landing here and that if we could it wouldn't do you any good, but "come thru" with something—whatever you can afford to give, in money or work. Don't let it be said that you were the only one who refused to assist in developing the district, or that you were willing to let the other fellow pay your share and receive no more benefit, perhaps not so much, as you yourself will receive. Besides the immediate benefit to be derived, it will be a matter of pride with you in after years, when Mosier has come into her own, to know that you were instrumental in her development. Believe that we CAN accomplish things and we WILL.

C. A. Hage, who owns part of the land thru which the road will pass to the landing, has very kindly allowed a change in the line which will give a better grade, requiring less labor and material to complete than the one at first surveyed.

E. A. Race has been in communication with a company in regard to a suitable boat for the landing and states that it can be secured for \$275. This boat is 20x40 feet in size, quite sufficient for our needs for some time to come. A similar boat in Portland would cost from \$500 to \$1000. It will be necessary to act quickly in the matter as the company will dispose of it soon.

A meeting will be held in the Bulletin office next Wednesday night at 8 o'clock, when the committee will report progress. It is desired that everyone interested—this means YOU—be present to hear what is being done and to register kicks, if you have any. An open meeting is the place for them. But come anyway.

The registration books close on October 29 instead of the 5th, as stated last week.

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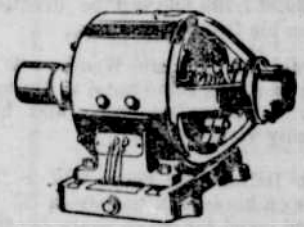
