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CITY HONORS
DEAD 'NEWSBOY'
Thousands Weep for Billy Rugh, Hero of Gary, Ind.

Streets Blocked and Funeral Held in Open-Coffin Showered With Coin for Monument.
Chicago—A funeral such as was never known before was accorded "Billy" Rugh, "newsboy," who gave his life that a girl might live. Greater homage in pageantry and grandeur has been paid kings and statesmen beloved by nations but this was a spontaneous tribute from the hearts of men and women in honor of a hero. Fifteen thousand persons, singing "Nearer My God to Thee," crowded about his casket on a street corner in Gary, Ind., Sunday afternoon. By their very numbers they had blocked a mile long funeral cortege and prevented the holding of a church service.

Strong men of many races, workers in steel mills that were closed in Rugh's honor, went as they formed in line with their employers and walked slowly past the coffin of the dead "newsboy." Their wives and children were with them and many stretch forth their hands in an effort to express their reverence by offering money for the erection of a monument. Policemen found difficulty in explaining to hundreds of the mourners, for they all were mourners, although some could not speak English, that they must not shower the coffin with money, but must keep it until arrangements for the memorial tribute could be made.

The coffin, buried in the floral offerings of city officials, fraternal organizations and private citizens, was carried in a crepe trimmed fire department automobile from the undertaking establishment toward the First Methodist church. Thousands blocked the streets and the church was filled to overflowing long before the advance squad of policemen, leading the procession, arrived. Then the plans were changed and it was decided to hold the service from the church steps. But the procession never got that far. When the corner before the church had been reached the crowd was so dense that this plan had to be given up.

Instead, a space was cleared in the center of the road and there, upon low rests, the coffin was placed. Led by the church choir and with music furnished by two bands that had donated their services, the crowd sang old Gospel hymns as Rev. J. M. Avann stepped into the fire department automobile and utilized the seat as his pulpit. Thousands of persons upon nearby porch roofs joined in the singing. The pastor likened the dead hero, to the Christ, and quoted from the Bible. "He saved others, yet himself he could not save." This was his text.

CAPTURE TURKISH WARSHIPS
Greek Gunboats Make Big Haul in Mediterranean.
"San Francisco—Three Turkish ships were captured and one destroyed Sunday by the Greek gunboats A and B, according to a cablegram received here by T. B. Mountanos, editor of the California Greek newspaper. A Turkish torpedo boat destroyer and two gunboats were captured in an engagement against the Greek port of Naxos. The gunboats captured were said to be part of a consignment of five ordered from Germany by the Turkish government. The cablegram was dated Athens.

London—On the mountainous front of 200 miles from Kirk Killeseh in the east to Ukup in the west the advance of the allied armies into Turkey continues. The Turkish army appears to be acting on the defensive. Its outposts are slowly withdrawing and are attempting only to screen the way for mobilization while the main forces are marching toward the frontier.

Wood Favors Presidenc.
San Francisco—Major-General Leonard Wood, chief of staff of the United States army, announced after an inspection tour here that he would recommend to the War department that congress be asked for an appropriation of \$4,000,000 for improvements at the Presidio. His plans, he said, included provisions for an additional regiment of infantry and artillery each, a concrete warehouse and a new administration building, all of which he said he hoped to see completed by 1915.

Rebels Fire on Street Parade.
Mexico City—Twenty-two persons are said to be dead and a large number wounded as the result of rebel troops firing on a parade of citizens in Vera Cruz. Earlier reports had 15 killed. The demonstration was made to show the loyalty to the government of those who participated. Failing to stop it, Felix Diaz, the rebel leader, who controls the town, ordered the troops to fire. Diaz, according to a story current here, is greatly handicapped in the progress of the revolution by the lack of arms and ammunition.

Thief Passes up \$25,000.
Skagway, Alaska—Nearly \$25,000 in gold in the Wells Fargo company express office was passed by a robber who sandwiched Agent Herbert Taylor Saturday night. The robber took a package containing \$1200. When Taylor went into a rear room for a bucket of coal the robber, who had been concealed in a closet, struck him over the head. Taylor lay unconscious until next morning.

Two Aviators Fall to Death.
Geigen, Germany—An aeroplane piloted by Lieutenant Weisbart, a German military aviator, and carrying a passenger, fell to the ground from a great altitude while flying near here, and both men were killed.

REBEL ELEMENTS UNITED.
"Plan of Vera Cruz" Declared to Have General Backing.
El Paso, Tex.—"All revolutionary elements in Mexico today are co-operating to the one end—the downfall of Madero and his government," declared Attorney Gomez Robelo, personal representative of the revolution of Pascual Orozco in the north of Mexico, when seen in his hiding place in El Paso. Released from jail here and exonerated from political charges preferred by the Mexican government representatives, Robelo is avoiding arrest, but is keeping in touch with developments, not only along the border, but at the national capital.

"I have evidence here," said he, producing letters to prove his assertion, "that the revolutions begun by General Felix Diaz and General Aguilar, in the state of Vera Cruz, is in conjunction with Orozco's movement in the north. The Federals will not fight against the rebels. How, then, will they fight against their brothers, the Federals, who have revolted in Vera Cruz? That so no man has been championed for president of the republic is proof that the new movement will be popular. Always, before, has Mexico been cursed with revolutions prompted by some particular man. This revolution in the north, of the military in the south and so on of all the people, merely is the outcry against a national shame." Robelo produced letters to show that the Vera Cruz revolt of the troops in Vera Cruz, was made in conjunction with a general plan, part of which has not transpired.

He showed a copy of the "plan" of Vera Cruz, mailed from Mexico City two weeks ago and containing predictions of the Diaz uprising. Robelo says General Orozco continues toward the south in the state of Coahuila, and soon will be working in conjunction with the Federal troops, which it is predicted will turn in the north. All remains quiet in Juarez, with all communication cut with the south, no movement has been made either from Juarez or Casas Grandes to prevent the destruction of the Mexican Northern railway by rebels. Federal troops in all the north of Mexico are resting on their arms.

FELIX DIAZ HAS PRESTIGE.
Ambassador Wilson Regards New Element as Not Inconsiderable.
Kansas City—"This uprising contributes a new element to the revolutionary situation in Mexico and is not an inconsiderable one," Henry Lane Wilson, ambassador to Mexico, said when he heard of the capture of Vera Cruz by General Felix Diaz.

Mr. Wilson, who left Mexico City five days ago with his wife, is visiting friends here. "General Diaz is a man of great prestige both with the army and public," Mr. Wilson continued. "Hitherto the revolutionary movement against the Madero government has been headed by men whose names expressed no special significance and all lacked some essential leadership. I have no doubt that the Madero government will exert itself to its greatest activity and endeavor to meet the new conditions."

CUPID'S "C. Q. D." IN KITCHEN
Threat of Law Demanding Proof of Domestic Sins Wins.
Portland—The statement made by H. C. Campbell, of the school board, in his address at the opening of the new Lincoln high school building, that legislation was contemplated which would require every woman to exhibit a certificate of graduation in domestic science before she would be allowed to obtain a marriage license, is showing the desired effect. This is shown by the fact that 52 young women were enrolled in the domestic science night school only two days after it opened. Members of the school board, upon hearing the report of Superintendent Rigler to this effect at their meeting recently, congratulated Chairman Campbell on the success of his implied threat of a life of manliness to all girls not possessed of a domestic science certificate.

Servia Declares War.
Belgrade, Serbia—War against Turkey was declared formally by the Serbian government. The declaration was transmitted to the Serbian minister at Constantinople with instructions to present it to the Porte. The minister then will leave immediately for Belgrade. The great powers will receive notification at once of Serbia's declaration. Immense crowds paraded the streets, singing and cheering after the announcement was made. The crowds are increasing hourly and an enthusiastic war spirit prevails.

Peril of Americans Seen.
Washington, D. C.—Officials here became thoroughly alarmed over the imminent danger to Americans in Vera Cruz, Mexico, captured by the rebels, and Beekman Winthrop, acting secretary of the Navy, ordered the cruiser Des Moines, now making a tour of Mexican ports, to return to Vera Cruz. Commander Hughes will have full power to exercise his own discretion in safeguarding Americans in the beleaguered city and without further instructions can land a party if conditions warrant.

Marconi Loses Right Eye.
Spezia—Giugliemo Marconi's right eye, which was injured in an automobile accident on Sept. 25 last, has been removed. A consultation had resulted in a decision that removal was indispensable, as the famous wireless inventor was threatened with total blindness. Professor Fuchs, the celebrated oculist of the university of Vienna, was summoned in hot haste and he performed the operation, which, it is said, was successful.

Greece Wants Reservists Only.
Cincinnati—A telegram saying that the Greek government wants only men who have had military training in the Grecian army and are now reservists to fight against Turkey, was received by Dr. Sophocles Dasakis, president of the Cincinnati branch of the Pan-Hellenic Union, from Mr. Siniadinos, of New York, president of the union in America.

Unsatisfying Menu.
The young girls who work in the Paris shops have 50 centimes to spend for their midday meal, and when a charitable society inquired as to how the money was being spent, the following list was found to embody the average: Fried potatoes or sausage, 10 centimes; bread, 10 centimes; bonbons, 10 centimes; violets or other flowers, 20 centimes. The society no longer had any cause to wonder why the girls were undernourished and ill-nourished.
