MOSIER MAN RECEIVES HIGH HONOR

An office of considerable distinction has been offered our fellow townsman, Robert M. Ross, Cashier of the Mosier Valley Bank, who this week received notice of his selection as Vice President of the National League of Business men, for this State, and President of the Oregon organization, and has signified his acceptance.

This League, recently organized, is non-partisan, or rather, omni-partisan, in its membership and now numbers among its members some of the most prominent and well known business men of the United States. The president of the League is Cleveland H. Dodge, of Phelps, Dodge & Co., railroad builders, and the secretary is C. H. Ingersoll, of the Ingersoll Watch Company.

These and other independent business men of the country are awake to the favoritism, the high prices and other evils that have resulted from the radical high protection policy that has prevailed here. They know the wide-spread demand of the people for relief from some of their burdens, shown in the utterances of the three leading party platforms this year, all pledging downward revision of the tariff duties. They are pleased with the plain, clear, logical, business like utterances of Governor Wilson on this and other vital questions and hence are supporting his candidacy. Assuming that his election is practically assured, the League is completing its organization in all the states, with the avowed purpose of promoting a safe and sane policy in the relation of business to government by securing the active cooperation of business men of all sections and parties who will make known to the president elect the interests and needs of general business and uphold his hands in policies where he might otherwise be thwarted.

Governor Wilson has expressed his approval of the purposes of the League, and among other things says: "The problem of politics is cooperation, and I am very sure that just as soon as the business of this country has general, free, welcome access to the councils of government, all the friction between business and politics will disappear." He has shown a desire to take counsel of independent business men and the people themselves, instead of acting on preconceived ideas and counseling only with the commercially interested parties. Along this and similar lines the National League of Business Men expects to be of assistance to the new administration.

Announcements concerning the state organization will soon be made.

Among the many questions to be considered by the local voters at the polls next Tuesday is one in particular which should be of great interest to them. It is the initiative measure to establish a High School Fund for Wasco County. This measure is one of great importance to citizens of the county and should receive the support of every voter.

The Hotel Mosier changes hands again this morning. F. R. Howard has disposed of his interest as manager to Guy Q. Stryker and wife, of Portland, who have had large experience in catering to the wants of the public. Mrs. Stryker's mother and brother, Mrs. M. Vote for Millage Bill Number 320 X Yes

It provides that the mill tax for support of Agricultural College and University of Oregon, giving them permanent support and taking them out of politics. It also provides one Board of Regents, thus solving the problems of co-operation, consolidation, division of courses and economy of management.

It does not increase the average rate of taxation. It repeals the \$500,000 University appropriation bill.

The Bill is endorsed by Governor West: "This Bill is in the interest of good business and should pass."

PARCELS POST

The Parcel Post Bill passed by the last Congress was its greatest work. It benefits the Oregon merchant and farmer. By it you send 11 pounds on any rural route for 15 cents; 11 pounds on any city route for 15 cents; 11 pounds to any customer within 50 miles for 35 cents; 11 pounds to any customer between 50 and 100 miles of your store for 46 cents. But 11 pounds from Chicago or other mail-order cities will cost not less than \$1.32.

Senator Bourne is entitled to the credit for the construction and authorship of this bill, which goes into effect January 1, 1913. Had Bourne neglected this bill in April (primary time) it could not have become a law. He stuck to his post regardless of personal danger.

CITIZENSHIP

Bourne has lived in Oregon 34 years. He owns large interests in several counties. He is a strong supporter of the Oregon System, having assisted in its formation. His speech on Popular Government was issued to 2,700,000 readers at his own expense, and he has advertised the state throughout the world.

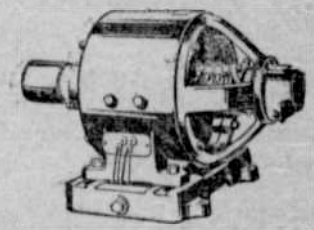
