SPAIN'S LEADING STATESMAN SLAIN

Canalejas Shot in Back by Daring Assassin.

Murderer Attempts Suicide, But Falls—Act Believed to Be That of Individual, Not Conspirator.

Madrid, Spain—Jose Canalejas y Monda, the prime minister, whom Spain regarded as one of its greatest statesmen, was shot and killed Tuesday by a young anarchist, Manuel Paredinas.

Canalejas was shot in the back three times as he was walking to the ministry of the interior. He had stopped to glance into the window of a book store.

He had just been to the royal palace to submit several decrees to the king. He emerged smiling and happy. As an attendant opened the door leading to the street, a strong gust of wind struck the premier in the face, causing him to exclaim gaily:

"Oh, what a wind! We are going to have a bad day!"

About an hour later his prophecy was fulfilled. As he stopped for a moment at the shop window, a man darted from a near-by doorway. He ran up behind the premier and fired four shots at close range. Three bullets took effect.

Canalejas sank to the sidewalk. A friend who was passing at that moment rushed up crying, "Don Jose, Don Jose," it being the premier's baptismal name.

The wounded man scarcely had strength to murmur, "The scoundrel has killed me." He then expired.

In the meantime his assailant turned the muzzle of the revolver on his own breast and fired again. A crowd quickly gathered, while the assassin was half dragged to the police station.

The premier was carried to a pharmacy and then to the ministry of the interior, where he was placed on a large marble table in the main salon.

OREGON GOES FOR WILSON.

Lane, Democrat, for U. S. Senator—Woman Suffrage Safe.

Portland, Nov. 7.—Any lingering doubt that may have existed of Woodrow Wilson's victory in Oregon were removed by the receipt of fuller returns from Multnomah county and the state at large, but the figures still failed to give final results on the senatorial situation.

The returns leave no room for doubt as to any results on the state ticket and congressional ticket. Hawley, in the First, Sinnott, in the Second, and Lafferty, in the Third, are well to the good over their opponents.

Olcott is elected secretary of state, Mickle, dairy and food commissioner, and Aitchison, railroad commissioner. If present ratios be carried out, Wilson will have a plurality over Roosevelt of about 7500.

There is still an element of doubt as to whether Roosevelt or Taft will win second place, but the outlook seems to favor Roosevelt. In the state outside of the county, Roosevelt and Taft totals are almost identical, but in Multnomah county the returns indicate a final lead for Roosevelt over Taft of about 2000.

With about one-half the vote counted in Multnomah county and the state outside, the totals on president are as follows: Wilson 21,088, Roosevelt 17,341, Taft 16,196.

Returns for about one-half the vote outside of Portland are at hand and these added to the Multnomah county figures, which are also representative of about one-half the vote, give Selling a slight lead. However, the outside vote is more nearly complete from the anti-Selling counties than from those that are supposed to go for the Republican candidate.

The latest figures are as follows: Selling 20,496 Lane 20,512 Bourne 13,992, Clark 6697, Paget 3095. This gives Lane a lead of 178 votes and indicates a final plurality against Bourne of about 12,000.

SUFFRAGE HAS SLIGHT LEAD
Too Many Road Measures Brings On Defeat of All.
Portland, Or., Nov. 7.—The count at 2:30 a. m. in Multnomah county on woman suffrage was: Yes 8029; No 7627.

State, outside of Multnomah county: Yes 21,210, No 11,861.
The Malarkey public service bill, submitted by referendum, it is indicated, will have a substantial majority.

As was forecast, the three-cornered controversy over road measures apparently has resulted in the defeat of all plans, although the harmony amendment limiting county indebtedness for roads is in doubt. Seemingly all tax measures submitted by the tax commission and legislature, except the repeal of county tax option and probably the bill excepting the exemption of household effects, have been rejected.

The capital punishment bill, which, if adopted, would have abolished the death penalty in Oregon, is defeated according to incomplete returns by upward of 20,000 votes. The Cascade county measure is snowed under and the hotel inspector bill is in the running for cellular championship. The blue sky law also seems to have gone to its death in the avalanche of "noes." It is probable that the anti-boycott bill has been defeated, but there is still doubt as to the anti-street speaking law.

LISTER BEATS HAY BY 886

Washington Strong for Roosevelt for President.

Many Progressives Get Places—Falconer and Bryan Elected Representatives at Large.

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 12.—Ernest Lister's lead for governor was increased 123 votes in Washington when a recheck of the returns in Snohomish county was made. Lister's plurality over Governor Marion E. Hay is now 886. The total vote for the state, with 17 precincts still unreported, is: Lister, Democrat, 96,469, Hay, Republican, 95,573.

Seattle, Nov. 7.—Theodore Roosevelt's plurality over Woodrow Wilson in Washington is estimated at 23,000. Earnest Lister, Democratic candidate for governor, was elected by a plurality estimated at 8000 over Governor Hay, Republican.

J. A. Falconer and J. W. Bryan, Roosevelt Progressives, probably are elected representatives-at-large over the Republican candidates, H. B. Dewey and J. E. Frost, by 5000 plurality. In the First district one-sixth of the precincts give Representatives Will E. Humphrey, Republican, 16,000 plurality over Charles G. Heifner, Democrat.

One-fourth of the precincts in the Third district give Representative William L. Loflette, Republican, 440 plurality over F. M. Goodwin, Roosevelt Progressive. Returns from Southwest Washington indicate the defeat of Congressman Warburton, Roosevelt Progressive, by Albert Johnson, Republican. Warburton leads in Tacoma, but this lead, according to available returns, will be more than offset by Johnson's apparent big advantage in the Grays Harbor section.

Vancouver, Wash., Nov. 7.—Complete returns, semi-official, from 26 out of 36 precincts in Clark county give: For president—Taft 1216, Wilson 1601, Roosevelt 1247. Congressman-at-large—Frost, 1363, Dewey, 1452. Connors 1123, White 1059, Brown, 738, Falconer 756; District, Johnson 948, Muldner 2396, Warburton 723. Governor—Hay 1556, Lister 1425, Hodge 767, Hart 1601, Collier 1210, Teas 720. Secretary of state—Howell 1831, Ryan 1134. Treasurer—Ford 746, Meath 1551, Gilbert, 1127, Corey 826. Auditor—Clausen 1617, Stevenson 1116, Moberg 718.

For attorney general—Tanner 1586, Jones 1125, Mills 736. Land commissioner—Savidge 1714, Schooley 1078 and Kaufman 708. Superintendent of public instruction—Mrs. Prescott 1600, Mrs. Monroe 1122, Beach 793. Insurance commissioner—Fishback 1677, Murphy 1129, Collins 704.

The vote on the amendments to the state constitution follow: No. 1, removing limit from terms of office, for 902, against 1214. No. 2, recall of judges, for 1722, against 539. No. 3, initiative and referendum, for 1682, against 565. No. 4, setting time for new laws becoming effective, for 975, against 806.

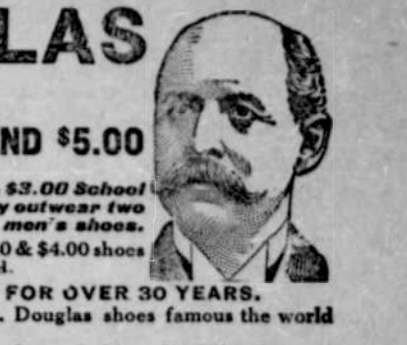
"Wets" and "Drys" Break Even.
Seattle—The "dry" and "wet" issue in Washington was one of the most important local questions to come up. The victory is about even for the saloon and anti-saloon forces. Licensed saloons won out in several instances but the general tendency was to maintain prohibition. Kennewick, which has waged a bitter fight, voted to remain dry, and Vancouver, after a spirited contest, decided to stay wet.

Oil Dividend Declared.
San Francisco—The 16th dividend on the stock of the Standard Oil company incorporated in California was declared Wednesday by the board of directors of the company at a meeting held in Richmond, Contra Costa county. A dividend of \$2.50 per share will be awarded on December 15 to all stockholders having stock of record on December 2. The issued stock is now valued at \$45,000,000. It was in 1910 that the last dividend was declared.

Kansas for R. R. by 10,000.
Topeka, Kan.—Returns at the latest indicated that Roosevelt would carry Kansas over Wilson by probably 10,000 plurality. Taft apparently was running a poor third.
