Lecture on Country Life.

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County School Superintendent Clyde A. Bonney, of The Dalles, spent Tuesday in town visiting our school and getting acquainted with the teachers and some of the patrons. Mr. Bonney was a pleasant caller at the Bulletin office and spoke in very complimentary terms of the school, the teachers and their methods of instruction. He also stated that Mosier will be entitled to draw \$40 per capita from the county high school fund, for all pupils in the ninth grade and up.

Over a hundred laborers are busily engaged re-laying the main track east and west of Mosier, with new 90-pound rails. This is in line with various other improvements being planned and carried out by the Harriman system this year for better freight and passenger facilities and the convenience and safety of the traveling public. It is rumored that double tracking between The Dalles and Portland will begin some time this year.

Some time ago, when it was thought necessary to operate on Mr. Carroll, investigation showed that, owing to the peculiar condition of that useless appendage, an operation would probably prove fatal. This is still the opinion of the physicians who have examined him, and the hope is now that the swelling, when it breaks, will be carried off through the large intestine. At the latest report obtainable, Mr. Carroll was thought to be slowly improving.
