GOOD RECORD FOR WASCO COUNTY OFFICIALS

The Dalles, Oregon, March 20th, 1913.

Crandall and Roberts, Accountants of Portland, who have been employed by the County Court of Wasco County, Oregon, having completed the audit of the books of the several officers of this County, and filed their report with the County Clerk of Wasco County, Oregon, on March 7th, 1913, which said reports of the accounts of the several officers are detailed and cover each and every item of the several accounts of the different officers. The Court having examined the various accounts finds as follows:

COUNTY CLERK'S OFFICE

The report shows that all the monies that have been collected by the County Clerk, have been duly accounted for and turned over to the County Treasurer of this County, and receipts obtained.

SHERIFF'S OFFICE

Report shows that during the last two years the Sheriff of Wasco County has collected in taxes over five hundred thousand dollars, and that during said time the Sheriff has overpaid the County Treasurer of this County on collection of the above amount of taxes \$2.06 which, considering the amount of money collected, is a record that is seldom acquired by a sheriff in the collection of taxes.

COUNTY TREASURER'S OFFICE

The Treasurer's books check out to a cent with no errors or discrepancies—a record which can be shown by a very few county treasurers for a period of two years.

The balance of cash on hand and turned over by F. S. Gunning to H. S. Rice, County Treasurer, on January 6th, 1913, was \$23,743.28, being the amount of balance shown in all funds.

LIABILITIES OF COUNTY

Warrants outstanding and subject to payment January 6th, 1913, \$2,000.98.
