Chemical pulp is also admitted free of duty from all na-tions with the exception that chemical pulp must pay \$2 per ton from those Canadian provinces which prohibit exportation of pulp wood.

continuation of tong warfare in Chinatown is to lock up the warriors. It has issued subpenas for the presidents and other officials of the belligerent Bing Kong and Suey Sing tongs and all gunmen. Heads of the police de-partment and District Attorney Fickert were also ordered to appear before the inquisitorial body. The grand jury expects to indict every Chinese against whom proof is adduced of conspiracy to commit murder.

For the 10 months to February 1, 345,000 foreigners arrived. Of these, 130,000 were British subjects and 119,000 cit-izens of the United States.




