THOMAS C. GODBERSEN PASSES.

It is with much regret that we chronicle the untimely death of Thomas C. Godbersen, which occurred on Friday of last week, at his home a few miles south of town, at the age of 29 years.

"Tom," as he was familiarly known here, had been in poor health for some time, having a complication of troubles. He went with two of his sisters to Los Angeles, last Fall, hoping that that climate would benefit him. He failed to improve, however, and, with his sister, Miss Dorothy, returned home about three weeks ago. He began to fail rapidly from that time, and everything that medical skill could do was done, but it was a losing fight. Death approached so rapidly that Miss Bertha, the sister who remained in California, could not reach home before he passed away, the arriving in time for the funeral, which was held from the Christian Church Monday forenoon. He was a young man of sterling worth, exemplary habits, an affectionate son and brother and a warm friend and he will be sadly missed by the entire Mosier community, with whom the Bulletin joins in extending sympathy to the bereaved mother, sisters and brother.
