To The Honorable County Court in and for Wasco County, Oregon:

We, the undersigned, qualified electors residing within the limits of the hereinafter proposed municipal corporation, as hereinafter described, do respectfully pray your Honorable Body that all of that portion of the said County of Wasco and State of Oregon, hereinafter more particularly described, may be incorporated as a municipal corporation with the name and style of the "City of Mosier."

Beginning at the intersection of the Section line between Sections One (1) and Two (2) Township Two (2) North of Range Eleven (11) East of the Willamette Meridian, and the South Boundary line of the J. H. Mosier Donation Land Claim; thence East along the south Boundary of said Donation Claim to the West Boundary of Hail's Addition as the same appears on the recorded plat in the office of the County Clerk of Wasco County, Oregon; thence South along the West Boundary of said Hail's Addition to the Southwest Corner thereof; thence East along the South Boundary of said Hail's Addition to the quarter section corner between Sections One (1) and Twelve (12); thence East to the center of Mosier Creek; thence down stream along the center of said

Mosier Creek to the South Boundary of J. H. Mosier Donation Land Claim; thence East to the Southeast Corner of said Donation Claim; thence North along the East Boundary of said Donation Claim to the North Boundary of the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation Company's right of way; thence Southwesterly along the North Boundary of said right of way to where the same intersects the center of Rock Creek; thence Southerly along the center of channel of said Rock Creek to a point due West of the Southwest Corner of the J. THE HABIT OF PUTTING OFF.

Procrastination has been called a great fault with farmers, says Peter Snyder, and no doubt the charge is correct, but the fault of putting off finishing a task is no more common among farm people than among people not on farms. It is too common in driving through the country to see all sorts of jobs unfinished—houses, barns, fences, a field half plowed, a garden only partly made, stock out in bad storms, because the yards and shelter had not been made ready, and many other evidences of an inclination on the part of the farmer to put things off. So we have come to charge the farmer with procrastination. We do not stop to think, however, that the results of the farmer's efforts are open to the view of all, and that his mistakes in doing his work are forcibly impressed upon us.

Procrastination, instead of being a fault peculiar in a large degree, to farmers is a fault of many people in all walks of life. The man who gets ahead in the world is he who tackles a job and sees it through to the finish. He is not constantly changing his plans. When he starts to build a house or a hen coop, he knows what he wants and gets just that, in spite of all obstacles. Was ever a task seen with loose ends on such a man's farm? To put off is easy; it grows to be a habit, and in the end a habit is hard to overcome.—Ex.

Record Crops Predicted A special to the Oregonian from The Dalles says: Although the crop of cereals in Wasco and Sherman counties this year will not surpass the crop of 1912, owing to the fact that the acreage is less because of summer fallowing, reports received by the Business Men's Association indicate a yield per acre that will break all records for this section. E. H. French, president of the banking firm of French & Co., has returned from an automobile trip to Shaniko, in the southern part of this county. He predicts that should the favorable conditions continue all records will be broken. Farmers who come to the city support the prediction. The fruit growers are also looking forward to a harvest of record-breaking crops of cherries, peaches, pears, apples, prunes, grapes and other fruits. Several hundred acres of cherries will come into bearing this year.
