## COURTHOUSE WILL BE FINISHED

Last week's Chronicle says that at the last session of the county court, the bids for the completion of the new courthouse were opened and it was found that A. A. Lambert, of The Dalles, was the lowest bidder, his figures being \$53,537. The highest bid, \$58,475, was that of Boyajohn & Arnold, of Portland. Says the Chronicle:

"The contract has not yet been awarded, pending the filing of the bond of the lowest bidder, A. A. Lambert, and the consideration of other matters of importance by the architect and the county commissioners.

"The work which will be included in this contract is for the outside finishing only. This will include stone work, which will cover the concrete skeleton to the first floor, the brick work and terra cotta which will reach from the stone work to the roof, and the completion of the roof. In the roof work will be included the drainage system to take care of the water from rain and melting snow on the roof, the skylight and ventilators.

"The retaining wall, fencing and copings along Washington and Fifth streets, which will be of granite, will be installed and the concrete stairways to the entrances on both streets will be covered with the same material.

"The greater part of the outside walls will be covered with a beautiful gray granite finished brick. The trimming around the windows and doors, the great columns at the front entrance on Washington street and the three-quarter round columns of the Fifth street entrance, and the cornice will be of terra cotta.

"The work will include all of the steel work necessary to the erection of the outside as well as the fire proof steel windows for the two main vaults.

"This will finish all but the interior of the building and will take several months, but it is hoped to have the work well completed before next week winter sets in. The interior finishing work will probably be taken up early in the spring of 1914."
