INSECTS BECOME IMMUNE TO SPRAY

In some of the apple growing sections of the state of Washington the growers have noticed that the lime-and-sulphur solution which is used as a spray to destroy the San Jose scale becomes less and less effective every year.

Scientists assert that this immunity is the result of the reproduction of the hardier individuals of the scale which survive the toxic action of the spray and breed successive generations with an increasing tendency to survive.

RAILROAD MAKES MORE CONCESSIONS

Further concessions have been made by the railroad along the route of the Columbia River road and the most difficult engineering problem on that portion of the road that lies in Multnomah county has been eliminated.

At the 33-mile post, at Oneonta Gorge, the county had determined to construct a trestle to carry the road above the railroad tracks at the points where the cliffs come down so near to the river as not to leave sufficient space for the wagon road and the rails.

The new proposition submitted by the railroad is to yield its present roadbed to the county and to move its tracks out onto a new fill, yet to be made. It requires that the county shall pay the expenses of re-locating its tracks, but this is estimated at \$5,262, scarcely more than half of the expense of the trestle.

This is another evidence that President Farrell meant what he said when he told us he would do all he could to help us build the road," says Judge Cleeton. "At every difficult point along the route the railroad has made concessions that have astonished us by their generosity.

"How about that clean-up day, shall we have it? There certainly must be enough public-spirited citizens in town to get out and give the town a good scrubbing once a year. Why, it's going to take the people of Hood River a whole week to clean up, and they are not such very dirty people, either. We ought to get the job done in two days at most. Let's do it. We want to be as clean as our neighbors.

The Columbia River is behind time this year in rising, owing to the late spring, but it is coming and the bottoms will soon be flooded.

BANK ROBBERS CAUGHT

"Postoffice Whitey" and "Manitoba Frenchy," the two men implicated in the attempted robbery of the Mosier Valley Bank three weeks ago, were apprehended at Spokane last Saturday.

The men admitted their identity, but claim that they did not come to Mosier at that or any other time. In order to establish the fact that these men had been seen in Mosier on the night of the attempted robbery, Sheriff Chrisman, accompanied by Ralph Gibbons, Chief of Police of The Dalles, came down on Wednesday and found several persons who thought they would be able to recognize the men who were seen here on the night in question, and they will go to The Dalles today for that purpose.

To The Honorable County Court in and for Wasco County, Oregon:

We, the undersigned, qualified electors residing within the limits of the hereinafter proposed municipal corporation, as hereinafter described, do respectfully pray your Honorable Body that all of that portion of the said County of Wasco and State of Oregon, hereinafter more particularly described, may be incorporated as a municipal corporation with the name and style of the "City of Mosier," under the provisions of an Act of the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon entitled An Act for the General Law for the Incorporation of Cities and Towns in the State of Oregon, filed in the office of the Secretary of State February 21st, 1893, the proposed boundaries of such municipal corporation being particularly described as follows, to-wit:

Beginning at the intersection of the Section line between Sections One (1) and Two (2) Township Two (2) North of Range Eleven (11) East of the Willamette Meridian, and the South Boundary line of the J. H. Mosier Donation Land Claim; thence East along the South Boundary of said Donation Claim to the West Boundary of Hall's Addition to the West Boundary of the recorded plat in the office of the County Clerk of Wasco County, Oregon; thence South along the West Boundary of said Hall's Addition to the Southwest Corner thereof; thence East along the

South Boundary of said Hall's Addition to the quarter section corner between Sections One (1) and Twelve (12); thence East to the center of Mosier Creek; thence down stream along the center of said Mosier Creek to the South Boundary of J. H. Mosier Donation Land Claim; thence East to the Southeast Corner of said Donation Claim; thence North along the East Boundary of said Donation Claim to the North Boundary of the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation Company's right of way; thence Southwesterly along the North Boundary of said right of way to where the same intersects the center of Rock Creek; thence Southerly along the center of channel of said Rock Creek to a point due West of the Southwest Corner of the J.
